One hundred years ago the U.S. Civil War came to an historic conclusion. The following gem is offered by a specialist in Naval covers.

LEE SURRENDER COVER Captain H.F. Rommel, U.S.N.

The Civil War period is rich in covers for a collector of Naval covers. To be sure, Naval postmarks did not come into existence until 1908, but there was interesting mail from Navy ships and there were interesting postmarks. Occasionally, the letter is preserved with the cover. The following historical gem was written by a cynical observer.

(Enclosed in an envelope with a double-circle "Old Point Comfort, Va." cancel, April 12th, with a grid on a three-cent rose stamp.)

U.S. Monitor Onondaga James River, April 9th

My Dear Doctor (the envelope is addressed to Dr. Bela N. Stevens, U.S. Government Insane Asylum, Washington, D. C.)

I have to apologize for not acknowledging the receipt of your prompt reply to my inquiry, but the fact is, we have had considerable biz going on here lately. I was obliged to go to Richmond and see if the female portion of the community was suffering much. Took about forty drops several times with Gen'l Weitzel in Jeff Davis "shebang", wiped my feet on Gov. Smith's carpet, made pretty faces to some F.F.V. females, and found that the moral status of Richmond Society about that of New Orleans when we entered the city. Reports from them today confirm my experience elsewhere, that woman becomes fearfully demoralized by war, and that good sesesh women, F.F.V.'s in Society, are the first to attend to all the little wants of Yankee Officers.

I need not tell you what you can better read in the papers about the city. The glory and shame have passed into history, and it has become the mecca of America, judging from the crowd flocking there. Wish you could visit me and we will take a cuss-ory view of the relic of Jeff-dom. I fear my insane business is up, as the fleet is scattered to Northern ports, and with them the insane men....Hold on a minute. There's a row-10 o'clock p.m. We were just startled by heavy firing down the river and thought the "gorilliers" might be trying to raid ita little in the rear, but our dispatch boat brings the glorious news that Lee and his army have surrendered and everybody is giving vent to his joy through gun powder. Lucky the game is about up and you need not expect any more naval fighting. If you could only see the earthworks and fortifications about Richmond and Petersburg, you would agree with everybody here that Grant has out-generaled Lee. (Under-lining as in original letter.

Perhaps they will now send our vessel to Washington Yard as she cannot go to sea. We may be neighbors yet.

I don't feel well. Good night.

CANADIAN TRAINING CAMPS IN WORLD WAR I* Dr. H. Fenigstein

The Canadian Army operated quite a few summer activity camps prior to WW I and the Canadian Postal Corps operated the field post offices in them. In charge of the first MILITIA FIELD POST OFFICE, when it was opened in Niagara Camp, 1909, was Captain W.R. Ecclestone (who was with the Canadians in South Africa in 1900). The earliest date, from this camp, is reported as 23 June 1909.

Sewell, Manitoba was redesignated Camp Hughes on 30 July 1915. A single-circle steel hammer cancellation (27-29 mm diameter) with inscriptions: FIELD POST OFFICE and CANADA MILITIA, in two lines in the upper half of the cancel, and the date in the middle, in two lines, and the name of the camp with the abbreviated name of the province in the lower left of the cancel is shown in Figure 1. Only two FPO's used different cancels with different inscriptions, e.g. Niagara Camp (3 kinds-with No. 1 or letter 'A' after FIELD POST OFFICE and the time in figures over the date) and Petawawar Camp (time in figures in addition to the common cancel).

Three Field Post Offices used machine cancels with the inscription FIELD POST OFFICE between horizontal bars (three above and three below) as in Fig. 2 and below:

Camp Borden, Chtario Toronto, Chtario Valcartier Camp, Quebec

Some of these camps did not stop operating until World War II or after being closed after WW I, were reopened and their cancellations were changed; instead of the CANADA MILITIA and CAMP, new inscriptions appeared: Military Post Office or M.P.O. and N.P.O. (for Naval Post Office) but this is another story. (See also p. 62 April Bull.)

For the collectors interested in the Military cancellations used by the United Kingdom Armed Forces Training in Canada, I would like to add another (Vol.XI, No.5, p.62) No. 15-British Forces Post Office 623 c/o MPO 511 Wainwright, Alberta using FPO 1018 cancellation during the period of 1st June-28 July 1965.

No. 16-British Forces Post Office 691 Oronocto in New Brunswick during the period 15th June-31st July 1965 (FPO 984).

No. 17-British Forces Post Office 700 Oronocto in New Brunswich during the period 30th July-11th Sept. 1965 (FPO 1012).

CANADIAN FORCES IN THE FAR EAST DURING WORLD WAR II Stanley C. Jersey

In the Autumn of 1941 two Battalions and one Brigade Headquarters from the Wimmipeg Grenadiers and the Royal Rifles of Canada were sent to Hong Kong to support two United Kingdom and two Indian Battalions for the defense of the British Colony. They disembarked on November 16, 1941.

Postal Arrangements

According to Canadian Army Post Office records, an Army Post Office was not attached to serve the force. Mails were made up and dispatched by the Army Base Post Office in bags labled "Force'C' Canadian Army Overseas Hong Kong" enclosed in outer bags labled simply "Hong Kong". The name of the office of origin was shown as "Base Post Office Canada". The outer bags were marked for dispatch via Vancouver and San Francisco. Owing to infrequent sailings from the West Coast to Hong Kong these mails were however subject to some delay.

Upon arrival at Hong Kong the mail was transferred to the local postal authorities who removed the outer bags and in turn delivered it either direct or through the British Army Postal Service to a Canadian Postal Corps N.C.O. for distribution to the addressees. The form of address used was as follows:

Regimental Number, Rank and Name Name and Details of Unit Name of Regiment or Branch of Service Force 'C' Canadian Army Overseas

The first dispatch of mail to the force was forwarded to Vancouver from the Base Post Office on November 2, 1941. Covers from the unit at Hong Kong can be identified by the senders mailing address from November 16, to December 25, 1941 bearing British Field Post Office cancellations or postage stamps of Hong Kong and local postmarks.

Hong Kong fell to the Japanese on Christmas day 1941 and mail for the interned troops was addressed similiar to the above, the only difference being:

Prisoner at Hong Kong, c/o Force 'C' c/o G. P. O. Ottawa

The contingent in Hong Kong was very small and because they were only active a short period before capture covers would be rather hard to locate in the tons of mail from World War II.

Meanwhile, the serious research reports are most welcome as are all articles of general interest to the membership.

Member Everal E. Keys (14742 Center Ave., Harvey, Ill. 60426) studying Free Fr. military postal history, would like to hear from members who might collect British FPO covers, especially of WW II North African campaign (1940-41-42) mailed by French or Free French troops operating with the British Forces; these would have the French cachet on the reverse. Also covers mailed to or from the Free French Volunteers in the French West Indies colonies and Dominica, St. Lucia or Trinidad in 1941-42.

CANADIAN MILITARY POSTAL NEWS F/L R. V. Furneaux

FORCES AIR LETTERS: Nothing new to report in this area since my last article discribing the watermerked form bearing the front panel inscriptions "5 A.M.S. (12/63)". I would like to emphasize the fact that these forms are issued free of charge by all Canadian Post Offices as they are authorized for use by civilians in writing to military personnel serving overseas as well as by military personnel overseas in writing to civilians in Canada and the U.S.A. at the concession rate of 5%. The watermarked form shows: "CHENEAUX BOND MADE IN CANADA"; this has now appeared in unwatermarked form. If any members would like unused copies of these forms I will send one to each member providing a self-addressed stamped envelope large enough to accomodate the folded form which measures 3 7/8" x 4 3/4". This will be mailed through the RCAF PO here at Sioux Lookout thereby assuring those interested of a good cover (plus the AL).*

MILITARY SLOGAN CANCELLATIONS: A slogan reading in three lines: "DENTAL CORPS/50TH ANNIVERSARY /1915-1965" has been in use since April 1965 off and on. I have examples from Ottawa, Vancouver, Winnipeg and Edmonton. In March 1965, Tronto used a four-line slogan reading: "ROYAL CANADIAN MILITARY INSTITUTE 1890-1965". I have not seen this one used from any other city. A slogan, for the 25th birthday of the Canadian Provost Corps, reads in three lines: "C.PRO.C./SILVER JUBILEE/1940-1965". It appeared in June from Halifax and Montreal. In September 1965, a two-line slogan reading "JOIN THE/CANADIAN FORCES" was used in Toronto, Winnipeg, Calgary, Ottawa, Saskatoon and North Bay. I have the French-English version from both Montreal and Quebec City and would be pleased to hear from anyone who has these from any other city. Montreal's bilingual version reads in three lines: "JOIN THE /CANADIAN FORCES/ENROLEZ VOUS".

RCAF STATION CANCELLATIONS: RCAF Station Lamacaza, Quebec is now served by a post office which has been opened on the base. The circular date stamp in use reads "RCAF STN LA-MACAZA P.Q." My only example is dated 11 VIII 65. I don't know what date this post office was opened but I imagine that it was not too long before 11 August 1965. It will be interesting to see if a new cds appears with ARC incorporated, (French abbreviation for RCAF), to be consistent with other Quebec stations.

In the province of Quebec, the following RCAF Stations are now using circular date stamps reading: "RCAF-ARC" vice the previous "RCAF STATION" hammers: Lac St. Denis, Mont Apica, Bagotville and Moisie. RCAF Stations Senneterre and St. Jean are probably using the new hammer but I've not seen them. Other RCAF Stations in Quebec are served by civilian post offices in the nearby towns and do not have canceling divices of their own. These are the RCAF Stations Val d'Or, Chibougamau, St. Hubert.

ROYAL CANADIAN NAVY MARKINGS: Mail received on and posted from ship away from their home ports receives a circular rubber date marking 1 1/4" in diameter. It reads "ROYAL CANADIAN" at the top, current date in the centre and "NAVY MAIL 67" (or other number depending on the ship) at the botton. Each ship is assigned a number for this purpose. Here is a partial list of numbers allotted and I'd appreciate hearing from readers who can enlarge this list.

CANADIAN MILITARY POSTAL NEWS CON'T.

MPO 103 CAMP GAGETOWN, NEW BRUNSWICK: Military Post Office 103 was set up at Camp Gagetown, N.B. in order to serve the 1500 soldiers engaged in six weeks summer training exercises commencing 14 June 1965. Mail originating from this Camp was cancelled with two different circular date stamp hammers. One reads "M.P.O. 103 OROMOCTO N.B." and the other reads "RCPC DET. No.2". This latter is short for "Royal Canadian Postal Corps Detatchment Number 2".

The Queen's Royal Surrey Regiment, of the British Army, took part in the summer exercises at Camp Gagetown, N.B., used English postage stamps and the FPO 984 cancels.

CFPO 5000 - UNIPOM(UNITED NATIONS INDIA PAKISTAN OBSERVER MISSION): On 29 September, a ninty-six man Air Transport Unit was despatched to Rawalpindi, Pakistan to serve with the United Nations. The unit was named 117 Air Transport Unit and will fly three Hercules transport aircraft and six Otter utility aircraft. This unit is commanded by Wing Commander R.T. Heaslip. The postal address of the unit is: Canadian Component UNIPOM



Avery, (of Darfield, Canterbury in New Zealand), a member of the Society of Australasian Specialists, is doing research into the Australian Military Forces' mail of WW II and would be interested in hearing from W.C.C. members who are also interested in this subject.

Member G.J. Raymond (P.O. Box 35143, Houston 35, Texas) is seeking covers from World War II with APO 718, 720 and 721 cancels and he would like to buy or swap.

Member A.L. Kennedy (4 High Street, Puckeridge, Ware, Herts, England) is seeking a cover from U.S. APO 233 which was located at Colliers End (near his home) in 1950s.

Auction Manager Tom McGrath has come across copies of the "U.S. Official Postal Guide" which lists all P.O.s by states, military installations, etc. for the years 1926, 1927, 1931, 1932, 1930, 1933, 1936 and a 1924 edition of P.O. regulations. All are old and dusty and some have a few pages missing. They are available to anybody interested who will pay the postage. Let Tom know if you are interested in one or all.

Member Gale Raymond also reports the receiving of a cover from a temporary joint U.S.-Australian Tracking Station on Manus Island off New Guinea. The P.-N.G. stamps are neatly canceled with a large cds inscribed "H.M.A.S. TARANGAU-LOBRUM, N.G.=". of 22SE65. This is a Royal Australian Navy Post and covers in previous years (late 40s and early 50s) were postmarked "R.A.N. POST OFFICE NUMBER 3". Do any members know if the new cds is a shore station cancel or is it a shipboard cancel-a ship working out of Manus Island? The cover is further endorsed "PROJECT ANNA".

U.S. MILITARY AND NAVAL AVIATION IN ITALY DURING WW I David D. Howell

PROLOGUE: THE URGENCY OF THE ITALIAN SITUATION

May 23rd 1915: Italy declares war upon Austria; the Italian Army moves against Trieste and Trent and, on 8th June, the Italian Army occupies Monfalcone. 7th July; explosion...the armored cruiser Amalfi a victim of attacking Austrian submarines.

Altho serious difficulties of terrain (the Julian Alps) slowed initial Italian advances, advance they did and were within sight of the original objective-Trieste. September 1917: Austrians crumbling, reeling and turning to their German ally for help. Due to the seriousness of the situation, the Germans very quickley sent seven battle-tried divisions and the objective, of the new combined Austrian-German offensive, was to throw the Italians back over the border and even further if possible. One German Detachment was led by a young officer: Irwin Rommel.

Soon the gallant Italian Army began suffering enormous losses of troops, equipment and the ground which they had previously held. Weary Italians fell back and back; near chaos became the "order of the day". But they held and, in desperation, Italian Government officials sought U.S. General John J. Pershing's help. The request was for one million troops but aid was not immediately forthcomming; because, at that time, America's army was mostly on paper...recruited and drafted young men who were mostly untrained at that time.

Strangely enough, a different form of help was forthcomming for the beleaguered Italians. In June 1917, the United States had sent a mission to study European aviation. Headed by Major Raynal C. Bolling (in civilian life a U.S. Steel executive), the group was called the "Bolling Mission".

Altho aviation theorist Colonel Giulio Douhet languished in an Italian prison, (because of his views on aviation), his friend and partner Gianni Caproni was on hand to welcome and influence Bolling Mission members Captains V.E. Clark and Edgar Gorrel. The latter two quickly became bombing enthusiasts after visiting the Italian front and watching the magnificent Caproni bombers doing their job high in the Alps. Originally, the Bolling Mission recommended the Caproni bomber to be used as the first model for American production. Later, they assigned chase (fighter) and observation aircraft the priority over all bombers. America needed all types of aircraft for training and combat purposes but in the United States, there was no aircraft industry or war experience and the great Liberty engine was still in the blueprint stage. And in Italy, our help was sorely needed; the Germans and Austrians were advancing into Italy.

PART IN U.S. MAVAL AVIATION

On the eve of World War I, the "baby", Naval Aviation, was but three years old. 10th January 1914: a news release by the U.S. Navy (Secretary Danials):

"The Secretary of the Navy has decided that the science of aerial navigation has reached that point where aircraft must form a large part of our naval force for offensive and defensive operations. Nearly all countries having a Navy are giving attention to this subject. This country has not fully recognized the value of aeronautics in preparation for war, but it is believed we should take our proper place."


When America entered the war, Naval Aviation was but six years old and of little significance as far as naval warfare was concerned. In the next nineteen months, how this little "child" was to grow is a story in itself. In some colleges, Naval aviation "Units" were formedend this provided background for the Naval Reserve aviators.

On the European scene, Naval Aviation was set up under the Naval Aviation Foreign Service. This was a detached service. England, France, Ireland and Italy received detachments; in addition, the Navy and the Marines manned a base, in the Azores, during our participation.

The Italians didn't just receive a detachment of U.S. Naval personnel; there was an extremely long period for negotiation between representatives of the United States and of Italy. (By a "Stroke of the pen", this writer is able to eliminate about six menths accumulation of the familiar "red tape" which prevented and restricted the growth of U.S. Naval Aviation in Italy.) Finally, a Memorandum of Agreement, between the Italian Government and the U.S. Naval Aviation Forces, Foreign Service, in Italy, was reached and provided for joint operation.

On behalf of the United States Government and U.S. Navy, H.F. Guggenheim, Lt. (j.g.), U.S.N.R.F. was the representative. Along with Cmdr. Spenser Grey, R.N., Lt. Guggenheim arrived in Rome on April 23rd of 1918. He immediately reported to the U.S. Naval Attache, then called on the Italian Naval representative (Filippi) and, on the day following, had an interview with U.S. Air Service Captain La Guardia. Essentially Lt. Guggenheim completed negotiations for a supply of Caproni planes by the Italian Government to the U.S. Naval Aviation Forces; also, agreement as to the type of operations to be performed by the U.S. Naval Aviation Forces.

At the onset, of the wartime operations, the U.S. Naval Aviation Forces, Foreign Service, in Italy fitted into the organization chart thusly:



Altho Lt. (j.g.) H.F. Guggenheim carried out the wartime negotiations, at all times the representative of the U. S. Naval Forces, Foreign Service, in Italy, was Cmdr. Train the U.S. Naval Attache. Lt. J.L. Callan was appointed, on May 10, 1918, by Cap't Cone and was to report directly to Paris headquarters. Lt (j.g.) H.F. Guggenheim also reported directly to Cap't Cone. The Italian Naval Captain, (De Filippi), was the Chief of Italian Naval Aeronautics with his headquarters in Rome.

Eventually U.S. Naval personnel received flight training, were trained as mechanics, received training in production methods, performed inspection duties, received gunnery and bombing reaining, received training as observers, operated naval stations and were engaged in combat operations. Later, some of them also flew Capronis.
