U. S. INTERVENTION IN NICARAGUA 1927-1933

Background

ollowing the Spanish-American War over a century ago, the U. S. became increasingly involved in Latin American affairs and began to act as the "policeman" of the Western Hemisphere by sending its military forces into other nations on a number of occasions. In this regard, during the subsequent three decades men were sent for geopolitical reasons

to various countries in Central America and the Caribbean, including Cuba, the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Mexico (Vera Cruz) and Nicaragua.


In one such intervention, U.S. Marines were deployed in Nicaragua from 1927 until 1933. In response to a revolution, which started in 1925, and ensuing political unrest and economic deterioration, a decision was made to send in an armed force. The commander of the Special Service Squadron deemed that the ships' detachments were not sufficiently strong and requested reinforcements. As a result, the 2nd

Battalion of the 5th Marine Regiment was dispatched from Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, and landed at Bluefields on the Atlantic Coast on January 10, 1927. Shortly thereafter, a second force from the 5th Marine Regiment landed at Corinto on the Pacific Coast on March 7, 1927, with some of them then proceeding to Managua.

Conditions continued to deteriorate, requiring the addition of the 11th Marine Regiment in early 1928 to suppress the rebels led by leftist General Augusto C. Sandino. One of the key functions of the Marines was to organize and provide training for a local National Guard (Guardia Nacional) which would take over the task of maintaining order in the country so that the U.S. forces could eventually be withdrawn. At its peak, the intervention force totaled 2,800 men, although the number present was substantially lower much of the time. The last Marines left Nicaragua on January 3, 1933.

Philatelic Aspects of the Intervention

Considering the relatively small number of men deployed in Nicaragua, it seems rather extraordinary that during a modest intervention that lasted for less than six years, at least 25 different postmarks were used by the Marines. Of these narkings, twelve were for use on ordinary mail, nine for use



on registered mail, three for money orders and one "Receiving" mark for incoming letters.

In considering the rapid replacement of postmarks, there are two likely explanations. First, most of them were made of rubber, which tended to deteriorate with use because of the tropical climate in Nicaragua. Second, as Mail Clerks were rotated in and out of the country, each new man might well

have brought in or had sent new canceling devices with his preferred wording, regardless of what markings had been used by his predecessor.

Another reason for the large number of postmarks was that, unlike the situation in most other military actions, quite a few postmarks were created that were designated for use by a specific military unit, such as the 5th and 11th Marine Regiments and the Aviation Squadron. These, of course, were in addition to the more generic cancels normally available.

The Postmarks

The earliest postal marking from the 1927 intervention in Nicaragua was a single-circle datestamp inscribed " 2^{ND} BAT. 5^{TH} REG. U.S.M.C./SPEC. SER. SQUAD." with three killer

bars to the right. (This designation was unusual in that "Special Service Squadron" referred to a Naval formation, not a Marine unit.) This marking was in use relatively briefly, being recorded from June 30 to July 22, 1927. Another early postmark followed soon thereafter, which noted the actual location. It was inscribed "Fifth Regiment, U.S.M.C./Managua, Nicaragua" in small letters, and its earliest recorded use was on 28 August 1927. Other postmarks followed in due course, as listed in the accompanying table.




Figure 1. Examples of U.S.M.C. Nicaragua Postmarks

Examples of some of the postmarks are shown in Figure 1. Some of the other markings did not reproduce well enough to publish, but it is hoped that the foregoing descriptions will suffice to identify them and to differentiate them from others with similar wording.

BRITAIN'S BEST KEDT SECRET

A Dutchman, Jugo Koch, invented and patented a coding machine in 1915. He did nothing with it. A German engineer, Scherbius, bought Koch's patents and manufactured the machine for the protection of business cables. In 1923 Scherbius showed off his renamed Koch machine, which he called "Enigma," at the congress of the International Postal Union, but soon after the machine mysteriously disappeared from the market. Colonel Fellgiebel, the Reichswehr's signals chief, recognized the military value of Enigma. Later, as a Major General, became the top cryptographic officer in Hitler's Wehrmacht. Fellgiebel had Enigma improved, saying that its messages would be completely indecipherable without another Enigma machine.

An Enigma machine sent from Berlin to the German embassy in Warsaw was intercepted by the Polish secret service and carefully analyzed. The Poles acquired a commercial Enigma machine in Sweden and began working on intercepted Enigma messages. In 1934 the Poles broke Enigma (figure 1). The Germans made so many changes that the Poles had to construct a theoretical machine that exactly matched Enigma. They called it "bomba" (a French ice cream specialty). The Poles did well using the "bomba" but it all ended in 1938, when the Germans changed Enigma.

In July 1939 the British, French and Poles met to begin the remarkable achievement called "The Ultra Secret." It was the construction of a machine that was in reality a primitive computer set up at the British cipher school in Bletchley Park (figure 2) by the British mathematician Alan Turing (figure 3). Upon British declaration of war on Sept. 3, 1939, Turing took up full-time work at Bletchley Park.

From late 1940 the Turing "bombe" (figure 4) made the reading of Luftwaffe signals routine. "Moonlight Sonata," the air raid against Coventry, planed for the night of Nov. 14-15, 1940 was known to the British two days before the raid. When the message reached Churchill's headquarters, the British Prime Minister was faced with a terrible and tragic choice. He knew that if any but the usual defensive measures were taken for the protection of Coventry, the Germans would suspect that Enigma had been compromised. In the end he made the decision he had to. Ultra was needed to win the war, and Coventry would not be defended.

By the end of 1941, as the U.S. entered the war, the battle of the Atlantic was moving toward an Allied advantage. When in February 1942 the Atlantic U-boat Enigma machine was changed this advantage was suddenly wiped out: nothing could be decoded and catastrophe loomed. Alan Turing crossed the Atlantic in November 1942 for highest-level liaison on the desperate U-boat Enigma crisis. Before his return in March 1943 the changed U-boat system had been brilliantly detected and decryption was restored for the rest of the war.

Alan Turing became an all-purpose consultant to the by now vast Bletchley Park operation. As such he saw the "Fish" material (messages enciphered on the quite different system used for Hitler's strategic communications) cracked by the Collosus machine (figure 5), brought into operation just before D-day, demonstrating the feasibility of large-scale digital electronic technology. Thanks to Enigma the British located the Abwehr agents sent to Britain and Ireland.

All important decoded messages were sent to the Prime Minister at 10 Downing Street, or during the weekends by courier to his residence at Chequers, Buckingham. If there was air raid warning the message was sent to the bombproof shelter at Storey Gate. During the Battle of Britain messages from the Luftwaffe revealed an unusually high decline in aircraft strength, leaving only 75% of the planes serviceable. Thus the interception squadrons could be sent to match the number of enemy planes. On March 27, 1941 "Ultra" revealed the movements of the Italian fleet in order to attack British convoys. In the ensuing engagement the British fleet annihilated the Italian fleet. The Italian losses were three cruisers, two destroyers and about 3,000 men, including Admiral Cattaneo. In a brief engagement on May 24, 1941 between the German battleship Bismarck and the British Home Fleet, in which Hood was sunk in five minutes, HMS Prince of Wales scored hits which pierced Bismarck's oil tanks and reduced her speed. "Ultra" intercepted a message from Bismarck specifying her intention to make for Brest. The Admiralty calculated the possible route and a Swordfish aircraft from HMS Ark Royal settled the matter when a well-aimed torpedo crippled Bismarck's steering gear. The pride of the German navy was left a dangerous but certain victim for the oncoming British Navy.

On December 16, 1944 out of the mists and snows of the Ardennes, German troops struck with complete surprise in Hitler's last desperate attempt to stem the Allied advance, the Battle of the Bulge. As Hitler began his preparations for the attack he could take no chances. He forbade transmissions by telephone, telegraph or wireless of any information in connection with the offensive. Anything dealing with the offensive

had to be transmitted by officer couriers. On Dec. 26, 1944 Enigma was on duty again. A message from Field Marshal Rundstedt to Hitler in Berlin mentioned that it would be impossible to reach Antwerp. General Eisenhower immediately gave the order to attack the flanks.




Figure 6. Censored air mail letter sheet posted in Karachi, India on April 13, 1944 (censor B-23 at Karachi), from a Royal Navy commander to his wife, employed at the secrets center. Undercover address P.O. Box 111, Bletchley.

Because of the need for secrecy relating to Enigma, employees at the facility used an "undercover" address, P.O. Box 111, Bletchley, Buckhamshire (figure 6).

The existence of Enigma was first communicated to General Eisenhower and Marshal Alexander followed by Generals Clark and Patton and, after D-day, to the commanders of the American, British and Canadian armies. In a letter dated July 1945, addressed to the employees at Bletchley Park, General Eisenhower expressed his gratitude with the following words: "The messages from your services were inestimable. They considerably simplified my task of commander in chief, saved thousands of lives, and contributed to the final defeat of Germany."

Thai Military Courier Correspondence in WW II

A quantity of military courier correspondence from World War II not seen before appeared on the market in Bangkok a couple of years ago. Speculation is that it came from the estate of a recently deceased dignitary whose father had been a World War II era general. Or possibly the recent economic crash had motivated some custodian to "liberate" some material from old archival files. The actual provenance, as with most such caches that appear suddenly on the market, will probably never be known except to those responsible.

The items mostly date from 1939-41, although there are also some Japanese military covers addressed to the Nippon-Thai command which date from after the arrival of Japanese troops in December 1941.

The illustrated cover is more traveled than most, resulting in an unusually colorful plethora of markings, but is otherwise fairly typical.

This was dispatched from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (typed on front lower left, document 12104 of 1939 upper left), addressed to the Officer in Charge at the Ministry of Defense. The pair of small rectangular handstamps on the top front read "Secret" and "Restricted." The large red embossed seal of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, over-signed by the sender, seals the back flap.

The larger boxed rectangular handstamps, mostly in purple, permit tracing the route the cover took. To the right of the seal on the back is the receipt at the Ministry of Defense: October 17, 1939 at 1450 hours, number

14170. Bottom center on the front is the receipt of the Department of the Army (which, for all practical purposes was the same as the Ministry of Defense): October 17, 1939 at 1543, number 11007.

From there it was directed in big blue crayon to the Navy Department, where it went to two different offices, one to the right of the address on October 16, 1939 at 1600, and the square one below that on October 18, 1939 at 1000.

From the Navy it went to the Air Force (to the left of the seal) on October 31, 1939 at 0900. And finally (to the upper left of the seal) to the Joint Chiefs of Staff on November 6, 1939 at 1435.

The labels used to re-seal the envelope are ones used by the various agencies on classified material. These (and others) have been illustrated and identified by H. R. Blakeney in the Spring 1999 issue of *Thai Philately* (Vol. 16 No. 1). The bottom seal, of which only a bit is visible on the left back, is the Army-Ministry of Defense label (red); on the opposite side can be seen part of the Navy label (black, with a red portion covered); and on top at both ends the Air Force label (also red).

Unfortunately the contents are missing. But the lag time between forces suggests that this was not a case of simply referring some matter to more appropriate offices. It looks as if it was a directive on which some action was to be taken by each force, with a final report back to the high command.





LOST and FOUND

The ebb and flow of commerce continues even in wartime. Goods are made, sold and paid for as if nothing were going on.

In June of 1940, with the world around them collapsing in a flood of fire and smoke, the bankers of The City, London's financial center, went about their business as usual. The London branch of the Chase National Bank of The City of New York, located at no. 6, Lombard Street, sent a registered letter to a Mr. Gabriel Debany of Aleppo, Syria, then a French Mandated possession in the Middle East. It was quite an ordinary piece of business correspondence, and had there been air mail service to Syria, the letter would have been just another piece of innocent business correspondence. But, because there was no available air mail service at the time, this piece of correspondence became a kind of rarity because it took 4½ years to reach its destination, and no one I asked seemed to know where it spent those "lost" years.

Ordinarily, the letter would have been carried by air to Syria on British Overseas Airways Corporation's long range Short flying boats. But, France had fallen to the Germans in June of 1940 and the last BOAC flight to fly over French airspace did so on June 10, 1940. Italy entered the war on Germany's side in June of 1940 and her fighters and submarines made travel over or on the Mediterranean hazardous. Syria was firmly in control of a government friendly to Vichy France, and Mr. Debany was a naturalized U.S. citizen living in Syria, the land of his birth.

The bank did not mail the letter via air mail and it is not known why. Did they know it would be too late to make the last BOAC flight to Cairo and points east, or were they being cost-conscious?

On June 8, 1941 Syria was invaded by the 7th Australian Division, part of the First Cavalry Division, the Fifth Indian Brigade and a Free French force under the French General Le Gentilhomme. They faced a Vichy-friendly force under another French General named Dentz consisting of 18 battalions with supporting artillery and planes. Damascus was the objective and the fighting raged furiously with heavy losses on both sides until the city fell. Elsewhere in Syria the fighting was off and on with the British calling in more reinforcements until, on July 12, Vichy envoys sued for an armistice. On July 19, 1941 a Free French government was installed in Syria.

Still, the letter remained undelivered.

On January 23, 1945 the letter arrived at the Damascus post office and was backstamped. On January 31 it arrived at the post office in Aleppo and was backstamped again with the date. Still it bore no clue as to its whereabouts for those 4½ years, and the other markings on front and back raised more questions than they answered.

We know this much: the rubber stamped number '35' on the face of the cover is a type 10A censor's mark that when decoded means that the cover arrived (somewhere) on the 29th of an unspecified month. The pencilled inscription '352395' when unscrambled means that the censor's personal ID is 353, that the letter arrived, again, on the 29th and that it arrived at district 5. Syria, under French mandate, was apportioned for political and administrative purposes, into five zones or dis-

tricts. They were: The Alaouites, Aleppo, Damascus, Greater Lebanon and finally, Djebel Druse. Aleppo, presumably, was zone 5. This is further supported by the manuscript inscription on the face of the cover that fine tunes the address and bears the phrase "...in the Aleppo sector..."

An examination of those markings would be in order.

- 1. Both flaps of the envelope are scaled with the bank's embossed seals and are overstamped with the Lombard Street's registered mail rubber handstamp dated June 6, 1940.
- Somewhere along the line, while in custody of Free French forces, presumably in Syria, the envelope was opened for inspection and sealed with a tape reading CON-TROLE, meaning that it had been examined and found free of contraband.
- 3. It had also been examined by a Free French censor who affixed his rubber handstamp bearing the Cross of Lorraine and the letters "C P" in the circle. This handstamp on the back of the cover ties the CONTROLE label to the cover and shows that it was affixed after the CON-TROLE label.
- This same censor stamp on the front of the cover again ties the CONTROLE label to the cover.
- 5. The Lombard Street post office registered handstamp appears on the front of the cover and bears the same date: June 6, 1940.
- The metered franking is for 6d, a seemingly modest amount for both postage and registry fees.
- 7. The registry number 7189 on an adhesive label confirms the status of the letter as registered, as do the crossed vertical and horizontal lines (in blue crayon) on the front and back of the cover.
- 8. The Arabic manuscript inscription holds no clue either. House numbers and street names were unknown in Syria at this time. The inscription was put on by the Syrian postal authorities to expedite (finally) the delivery of the letter. The inscription loosely translated reads: "Mr. Gabriel Debany in the Aleppo Sector, Azizich neighborhood, near Shakoor." If mail delivery was available the carrier was on a first name basis with the families on his route and the address as shown would be sufficient to enable him to deliver the letter.
- 9. The pencilled inscription "352395" that appears written across the censor stamp on the back of the cover is repeated on the correspondence in the envelope.

Given the circumstances of the time and the competing political currents at work, we can, I think, reasonably assume that this cover and the mail that it was a part of, went by sea, given the total lack of any air mail markings or transit stamps that might have been affixed along its route. It probably was held up in territory controlled by the Free French until they remembered they had it, and then sent along to its eventual destination when it became clear that Germany was defeated and that the Free French under DeGaulle were the victors. Or, the reasons might just as easily lie elsewhere. Whatever the reason, it is an interesting artifact of an old war.






Numbered Handstamps of German POW Camp Censors, World War II

BOOK REVIEWS

Occupied France and Some Unusual Mail

Unusual Mail in Occupied France 1870-1871, Ernst M. Cohn, 9½ by 9¼ inches, 200 + xii pages, hardbound, illustrated, James Bendon Ltd., Limassol, Cyprus, ISBN 9963 579 795. \$50 postpaid from the publisher, Box 56484, 3307 Limassol, Cyprus.

The author is a postal historian of world repute and this latest volume is a companion to his 1995 work, Ordinary Mail by Diplomatic Means During the Siege of Paris 1870-1871. Hitherto little known means of handling the mails during the siege are brought together in Cohn's latest book, where he writes of smuggling activities, censorship, and other treatment of the mails. Many of his previous articles and books were devoted to the well-known balloon mail of the Siege of Paris.

Now the author focuses on historical events and the curious handling of siege mail primarily by surface routes. The conditions in towns under siege are presented in some detail, including Bitche, Phalsbourg (no surviving mail has surfaced), Strasbourg (with its interesting Red Cross cards), Metz (where mail was clandestinely sent in bottles and pigs' bladders on the Moselle River), Belfurt, and others. However, a substantial part of the book is devoted to conditions and the unusual aspects of mail handled in and out of Paris, especially by smuggling.

By far the most fascinating part of the book deals with mails of Paris sent by private and commercial smugglers, via sealed pipe sections and zinc balls, in the Seine, by balloon, and even smuggled by postmen and journalists. Commercial smuggling was extensive as revealed by advertisements in *Figaro*. Details of the activities of specific smugglers are presented as well as discussions of French and German censorship procedures. What may be the first use of a censorship resealing tape is illustrated on an 1871 mourning cover inbound to Metz.

Despite the wealth of information compiled here, the author admits that much more research needs to be done to discover more correspondence of the period, to identify unusual and still unexplained markings, and to provide and document further details on the handling of siege mail. Cohn emphasizes that postal history can be documented by a thorough search of newspapers of the period, in addition to books and articles written well after the events.

No bibliography is provided. However, the copious end notes provide full citations to references in the text. A detailed index concludes the book but carries the curious running head, "Smuggled, Censored and Other Unusual Surface???" Aside from this and a glaring typo on the dust jacket and title page, the book seems well edited, printed and bound, i.e. another quality product from the House of Bendon.

U.S. Military Facilities WW I

Domestic United States Military Facilities of the First World War 1917-1919: A Postal History by Robert D. Swanson. Loose-leaf, 8½ by 11 inches, 378 pages, illustrated, published by the author,

Wailuku, Hawaii, 2000. \$40 plus \$3.20 shipping in the U.S.; also available on CD-ROM for \$30 postpaid from the author, Box 2867, Wailuku, HI 96793-7867.

This book is the result of more than ten years of study by the author. He sets out the limitations of his coverage. The book is restricted to fixed land-based facilities in the United States and its territories, so it does not include ships or camps in foreign countries. He does not include camps established after the Armistice. Rather than presenting a bibliography in conventional format, the author chose to describe each of his main sources in his introduction. He has used many covers from his own collection or those of friends to prepare the many illustrations.

The arrangement throughout the book is alphabetical by state, then by city and then by camp or facility. For example under San Diego, California there are entries for the Aviation Mechanics School, Camp Kearney, Naval Training Camp, North Island Aviation Field, Rockwell Field, and Camp Walter R. Taliaferro among others. For some entries there is no record of any postal history. For others, Swanson provides illustrations of camp cancels. For each entry there is a reference source where readers can obtain more details. He uses three principal sources, which are cited in his introduction.

For many of the entries there is extended text describing the facility or its mail. Two examples are the entries under Brooklyn for the Navy Yard and for Camp Upton. The illustrations are largely scanned material and are of good quality for the most part. In addition to the state listings there are entries for the U.S. Offices in China, Canal Zone, Guam, Hawaii, Philippines, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

A lot of interesting discussion is found in Appendix A, which is titled "Special Topics." Here the reader will find descriptions of welfare organizations, use of the terms "fort" vs. "camp," tank corps, medical mobilization points, postal history, rarity, patriotic covers, and a description of the hardware and software used to prepare this book. Appendix B discusses cancellations, and in Appendix C the author acknowledges the many dealers and collectors who helped him with the material used in the book. The fourth appendix is a 9-page listing of military abbreviations copied from a 1920s source.

The index consists of three parts. First is an alphabetical listing of camps, then a list of towns, and finally the listing of states with sublistings of the facilities. The work is obviously a labor of love for author Swanson, and he realizes that readers may have more information or corrections, which he would be grateful to receive.

[Ed. note: one of the interesting aspects of this book is that the author chose to use the Army Order of Battle as his primary reference, rather than some postal source. He understandably observes that the economics of self-publishing precludes the 5,000-mile trip to Washington to do research in the National Archives, but copies of the Postal Bulletin or the Postal Guide books of the era are available in many other libraries, on microfilm, or by inter-library loan. Either could have provided at least a skeleton list of military facilities that had post offices assigned. This book is nevertheless a formidable achievement and sends the collector to his albums, and hopefully from there to correspondence with the author in the hopes of contributing to a second edition of this work.]

British Civil Censorship During World War I

British Censorship of Civil Mails During World War I, 1914-1919, by Graham Mark, FRPSL. Sewn binding, card covers, 8½ by 11¾ inches, 288 pages, color illustrations. Available in the United States from book dealer Leonard H. Hartman, Box 36006, Louisville, KY 40233 at \$41.50 postpaid.

Every so often a book comes along that is destined to become the classic in its field. Such will be the case with this postal history reference work by Graham Mark, produced under the auspices of the Stuart Rossiter Trust.

This book is much more than just a compendium of WW I British censorship handstamps, letter resealing tapes or advisory markings. The author introduces us to his subject by describing the historical background to censorship of the mails up to the end of the nineteenth century. He then describes British planning for censorship during the period 1904-1914, the opening months of the war, development and growth from early 1915, and the objectives and legal aspects of censorship.

Mark goes into considerable detail about the operation of censoring the mails, mails to and from enemy countries, and undercover mail. The next five chapters, organized primarily on a geographical basis, provide details by continent and by country regarding the introduction of censorship of the mails to or from specific areas. Information then follows on the censorship of transit mails, inland mails, Admiralty censorship, prisoner-of-war mail, internee mail, exemptions from censorship and special categories of mail. A chapter is also devoted to the release of detained letters.

The book then provides an illustrated and annotated reference listing of "Opened by Censor" resealing tapes, censor enclosure slips, advisory notices, and censors' handstamps. The book concludes with an appendix that contains the dates of declarations of war, dates of the cessation of war, dates of peace treaties, abstracts of post office circulars and abstracts of circulars to surveyors of interest to researchers into WW I postal history and censorship.

There is also a bibliography and a very detailed index. Anyone with an interest in WW I should have this book in

their library.

Postal History or Souvenirs?

Kriegsausgaben unter deutscher Besetzung 1940-1945 [War Issues Under German Occupation 1940-1945], by Karl Heimann. Softbound, 76 pp. incl. 8 with unnumbered color ills., 51 ills. incl. many maps, 6 x 8½, 1997. No. 148 (new series) of Poststempelgilde (Postmark Guild), DM24 + 1.50 postage from author, An der Turnhalle 40, D-34134 Kassel, Germany.

A recent first exchange of letters led to the author's informing me about his publication, thus prompting me to add it to my holdings of publications about unusual philatelic topics.

In the foreword, Helmut Oeleker, head of the Guild, rephrases a quotation from Brühl's "History of Philately" (vol.1, p.119): "As they get older, they become more genuine," attributed to Kurt Karl Doberer. That will show the

reader what the author thinks about the issues described and discussed here.

In his own foreword, the author notes that the German post office had no connection with the stamp issues discussed in this booklet. He also doubts that authenticity can be claimed with certainty, given the possibility that these issues were created years after the end of the war. In at least one case, the "semipostals" of Brac (p. 28, his quotation marks), he mentions that expertizers have ceased to authenticate such material. (That is precisely what they should do as concerns Buffalo Balloon labels, with but two exceptions, and all Vineta Provisionals.)

Heimann assembled all available information of a geographic, historical, and philatelic character as well as eye witness accounts — many of which are contradictory and untrustworthy — before drawing his conclusions. Most, if not all, these products have not seen any postal service.

The collected articles cover local French issues of Dunkirk 1940, Lorient 1945, and St. Nazaire 1945; Balkan issues of Albania, "semipostals" of Brac, 1944 Macedonia; and Saloniki; Soviet Union issues of Ljady, the Ukraine, the areas of Gorochow, Lubomi and Wladimir-Wolynsk, issues with swastika imprint, map stamp of Gorochow, unissued (!) stamps; and the vignettes of the foreign volunteer legions, as listed in the Michel specialized catalogs.

As always in such cases, philatelists are free to collect whatever they wish, of course. They might wish to inform themselves about the nature of their collectibles, however. It is good to know whether an adhesive was created at the time it is claimed to have been in existence, has done postal service at that time, or is a souvenir (bogus, cinderella, or whatever) that was prepared merely to make money for its originators.

The booklet is reviewed here to remind (1) collectors that not everything for which a certificate is issued is necessarily what it purports to be; (2) expertizers that they ought to keep up with the literature about their specialties, and that not everything listed in some catalogue must be expertized; as well as (3) catalogue editors that listings should not be cast in concrete but be reviewed in the light of new knowledge.

Heimann clearly shows how to differentiate between postal history and souvenirs generally. The booklet is highly recommended to those who know German well.

Army Machine Cancels

Military Machine Cancels of the Army Postal Service, Part A, by Bart Billings; with Robert Payne and Reg Morris, Contributing Editors. 8½ by 11 inches, 106 pp, loose-leaf. Numerous illustrations and tables. Published by the Machine Cancel Society, Warren, Ohio. ISBN 1-200009-09-1. Price (to MPHS members) \$12.00 postpaid from Gary Carlson, 3097 Frobisher Ave., Dublin, OH 43017.

This monograph is the first in a projected series on the machine cancels used by Army and Air Force military post offices from the beginning of World War II to the present. Many studies of military post offices, particularly those of World War II, have been made — indeed, many have been published by the MPHS — but few have treated the postal markings used on mail in detail. Much of the inspiration for this new series of studies by the Machine Cancel Society has been research recently conducted in the National Archives by

our own Russ Carter. The rapidly growing ability presented by modern computer systems to organize data effectively has also been a help.

As the first book in a series, this volume devotes considerable space to a general discussion of the canceling machines used by military post offices, along with the system for classifying the resulting impressions. These discussions cover some 40 pages. The basic catalog listings in this first volume cover only APOs and Base Post Offices numbered 1 through 7, although these low-numbered offices used a huge range of machine cancels. An extended chapter is devoted to the 7th Base Post Office that operated in the Pacific during World War II, based primarily on studies by Richard Graham, columnist for *Linn's Stamp News*. Copies of intriguing documents discovered in the National Archives by Russ Carter complete this volume.

Future volumes will present information on higher numbered APOs and BPOs.

The authors acknowledge that most of the material covered in this book is from World War II, with relatively little information on the period of the Korean War and the Cold War that followed it. Since canceling machines are still in use by military post offices overseas, these markings still offer ample opportunity for future studies.

Those whose interest in APOs is confined to their locations on specific dates will not find much new in this volume, which depends heavily on our own *United States Numbered Military Post Offices* — Assignments and Locations as a primary reference. Those who have a deeper interest in the conduct of business at military post offices, and in the cancellations they have used, will find this a fascinating study and will look forward to future volumes.

The price of \$12.00 is a special to MPHS members because of our involvement in the production of the book. Order now before the undoubtedly limited press run is gone.

Korean War History

Much like the last issue of our *Bulletin*, the May 2000 issue of *Korean Philately* was devoted to the 50th anniversary of the Korean War. Much of the issue, beyond the usual Society business, offers articles on the subject. Included, for example, is an article on Canadian forces involved, with a list of CAPO and CFPO offices that operated in Korea. Another article details all of the American APO and BPO offices in Korea during the war, with dates and locations. There are other shorter articles of similar interest. Those who wish to build a Korean War library may well be interested in this special issue.

The Korea Stamp Society also has plans for a monograph titled *Postal History of the Korean War, 1950-53* (not seen). Price is \$25.00 plus postage, or free with a year's membership in the Society at the same price (this would include four issues of the Society's quarterly journal). Pan Am Pacific Flights

Pan American's Pacific Pioneers — The Rest of the Story, by Jon E. Krupnick has won awards for his histories of Pan American Airways and its romantic opening of the Pacific to air travel during the 1930s. This is the latest of his studies, undoubtedly devoted more to the story of aviation than to mail. His interests range far beyond covers, however. The book illustrates numerous vintage collectibles, from airline annual reports to china plates to baggage labels. Indeed, each book contains a certificate for a free poster to hang on your den wall.

Those with an enduring interest in the history of aviation in the Pacific will need this book for the library.

NEW BNAPS P.O.W. BOOK

The British North America Philatelic Society (BNAPS) has published a new book entitled *Internment Mail in Canada*, 1914-1919 & 1939-1946 by S.C. Luciuk. The book is part of the Society's popular Exhibit Series.

This 104-page photocopied spiral bound exhibit examines the postal history and markings of POWs and internees in Canada from both world wars. Several rare, unusual, and often unique pieces are illustrated to help tell the fascinating story of Canada's internment camps in wartime.

Examples from the First World War include a unique "internment operations" marking from Ottawa, scarce camp markings from Quebec's Spirit Lake and Valcartier, and an unusual personalized censor handstamp from Lethbridge, Alberta.

Second World War postal items include such elusive pieces as a registered cover from a refugee in Ile-aux-Noix, rejected mail to Fort Henry and Lethbridge, and a "released" handstamp from Hull, Quebec,

The book includes an addendum consisting of several pages of covers, Christmas greetings on FORM I.O. 20 post-cards, and some picture post cards illustrating camps and camp life. Offering a view of one of the best exhibits of this type of material in Canada today, the book will interest those who study POW and internment camp mail, or Canadian military postal history.

Philatelic Militaria

[The following articles appeared in recent issues of a variety of journals and may be of interest to military postal history collectors. Copies of the complete articles can be obtained through the American Philatelic Research Library at APS headquarters in State College, Pa.]

David L. Straight writes a column for *Stamp Collector* on back-of-the-book material, and his May 8 column focuses on the soldier stamps of Switzerland in World War I. Despite her neutrality, Switzerland felt compelled to maintain an army that guarded her borders. The soldier stamps were a type of charity label that helped raise funds for troops and their distressed families. Although military personnel had free franking privilege, these stamps were often used as a patriotic symbol.

In the monthly Danish journal *Skilling*, E. Menne Larsen, a noted military postal history specialist, is presenting a series of articles in the spring issues that tabulate significant postal events chronologically during the first 100 days of WW II. Each event is backed up with the source, such as the pertinent postal order by the postal service.

Canadian Forces CFPO 5140 located at Camp Maple Leaf in Skopje, Macedonia is discussed by John Conrad in his article in the May 23 issue of *Canadian Stamp News*. He provides some up to date information on these postal markings in Kosovo.

The Red Cross during World War I, as it pertains to Russia. is discussed at length by Natalie Krasheninnikoff in the April issue of Rossica. The main office of the Red Cross in St. Petersburg established an Inquiry Office for Prisoners of War, and in 1915 an office in Copenhagen. The author reviews the operations of the Russian, Danish, Swedish, and International Red Cross agencies using many covers to illustrate her points. Gabriel Sassower focuses on the Allied Armies in the East French Military Airmail Service Constantinople -- Bucharest in 1919 in his article in the May issue of the London Philatelist. Overland routes for mail between Western Europe and Turkey were damaged during the war, and so the French established this airmail route. Incoming mail from Constantinople was then forwarded by train into France from Bucharest. The service lasted from July 1919 until October. The author describes the one-franc service charge, the frankings, censorship and cachets used on this mail.

MPHS Secretary Bob Kinsley describes conditions during the summer of 1940 that affected French ships in the Mediterranean in the June issue of the American Philatelist. Because of hostilities by the British, a couple of French ships harbored at Beyrouth in 1941 sought refuge in Turkey. He illustrates mail from personnel in the French Navy sent from Turkey. In the same issue, Robert Collins writes about U.S. POW mail during the Korean War. In the early part of the war, prisoners were not allowed to write home. This changed when the Chinese took over the POW camps. Mail to and from the American POWs in Korea was censored in Peking but routed through APO 100 in Yokohama. POW mail is scarce as guards often destroyed the mail rather than sending it on to the states. Collins describes six POW camps in North Korea.

Erich Järvlepp describes the chemical testing employed by German censors during World War II in his article in the May issue of the *German Postal Specialist*. He mentions the different chemicals used to detect secret writing on envelopes and letters and reports that up to four chemical streaks can be found on some items. Some chemical compounds left color streaks of brown or blue while others were colorless and therefore are difficult to see.

Jim Boyden

Answer to Query 00/1 (J. L. Johnson)

In reply to J. Johnson's query regarding information on a Colonel Joseph P Vachon, members Kurt Stauffer and C. M. Nielsen advised that Vachon, then a brigadier general, was captured on Mindanao, Philippine Islands, with the American surrender in May, 1942. At that time, General Vachon was reportedly in command of the Cotobato-Davao Sector and of the 101st P.I. Division. In August 1942, General Vachon, along with all U.S. officers in the rank of colonel and above, was transferred to a Japanese POW camp in Formosa. Vachon was later transferred to Camp Hoten, Manchuria, from where he was released in September, 1945 and returned to the U.S. His home of record was West Branch, Maine. Camp Hoten was the same POW camp where General Wainwright, last commander of U.S. forces in the Philippines, was also held.

On the Show Circuit

Al Kugel won a gold, the APS 1900-1940 medal, and the American Philatelic Congress award for his "Philatelic Effects from Breakup of Austro-Hungarian Empire" at Philatelic Show in Massachusetts. At the same show, vermeil awards went to Karl Winkelmann for "The Dublin Censor Office: Irish Censorship During WW II," and to Paul Wittreich for "Ireland: Censored Mail During WW II." Paul also took a silver-bronze for "Around the World (WW II) on British Censor Labels via PC90 Codes."

At ROMPEX, Lew Bussey received a gold and the MPHS award for "French Naval Mail to America 1943-1946," and another gold along with the APS research medal and Postal History Society medal went to Richard M. Stevens for "France and Serbia – Allies in the Great War." At the same show Bob Kinsley received a vermeil for "The Conquest of Indo China 1861-1904." In the single frame competition there, Joseph Bock took a vermeil for "Allied Forces Using U.S. Military Airmail in World War II," and Steve Henderson also took a vermeil for "Operation Iceberg: The Naval Battle for Okinawa."

AT NOJEX, Jesse Boehret won a gold, the grand award, and the Postal History Society medal for his "German P.O.W. Mail: Camps in Japan 1914-1920." At the same show Al Kugel also won a gold along with the APS 1900-1940 medal of excellence for "Austro-Hungarian Forces in World War I." Arnold Engel received a gold and the section award for Third Reich material with his "Königsberg Censor Office 1939-1944," and a vermeil for "German Aerophilately During the Third Reich 1933-1943." A gold also went to Henry Laessig along with the APS 1940-1980 medal of excellence and the APS research medal for "Croatian Postal Rates 1941 to 1945." James Lewis took a vermeil for "German Official Postal Service in Occupied Russia 1941-1944."

At Canada's ORAPEX 2000 in Ottawa, Hendrik Burgers won a vermeil and the E. R. Toop award for the best military postal history exhibit (sponsored by the Postal History Society of Canada) for his "Canada in World War I: First and Last Contingent." In the single frame category, Eric Järvlepp received a silver-bronze for "German Censorship with Chemical Testing." Greg Pirozzi won a silver at NAPEX for his "The Holy See and Communications During WW II: A Survey."

Among U.S. exhibitors at Stamp Show 2000 in London, Al Kugel won a gold for "The Allied Intervention in Russia 1918-1925," Regis Hoffman took a large vermeil for his "Allied Forces in East Africa World War I," and George Cosentini received a bronze for "V-Mail."

Several literature entries in Canada's 5th National Philatelic Literature Exhibition in Ottawa were in the military postal history area. Galen D. Harrison received a gold and a prix d'honneur for *Prisoners' Mail from the American Civil War*. Vermeil awards went to Giuseppe Marchese for *La Posta Militaire Italiana* 1915-1923, Edizione 1999 as well as *La Posta Militaire Italiana* 1939-1945, Vol. 1, Edizione 2000.

At the World Stamp Expo in Anaheim, Al Kugel won a gold for "The Philatelic Effects of the Break-Up of the Austro-Hungarian Empire 1918-1923," Leslie Baird won the grand and a gold in the single frame entries for "Commercial Airmail Rates from Palestine During World War II," and in

the display class, Lawrence Sherman also took the grand and a gold for "World War II through American Eyes." In the Court of Honor, George Cosentini showed his "V-Mail."

At Madison, Wisconsin's WISCOPEX show, John Paré took a second place and the Postal History Society award for "U.S. Forces in Bermuda 1931-1995." Roy Koczarski won a gold at PIPEX with "The Polish P.O.W. Camp Posts During World War II," William G. Robinson took a vermeil for "Canadian Participation in the Anglo-Boer War 1899 to 1902 and in the South African Constabulary 1901-1906," Robert Rawlins received a silver for "The U.S. Navy Submarine Force at 100 – A Retrospective," and a silver-bronze went to Leonard Lukens for "Wake Island – Postal Markings and Materials Related to Its History."

At Minnesota Stamp Expo, Harold Peter took a gold and the reserve grand award with his "The Allied Military Government Stamps in Germany." At the same show Arnold Engel received a gold for "The Königsberg Censor Office 1939-1944," and vermeil awards went to Robert Koschalk for "German Occupation of Czechoslovakia" and to Al Kugel for "German World War II Occupation Mail." At INDYPEX, Al Kugel took another gold and the J. David Baker postal history award with his "The U.S. Army and its Postal Service Abroad During World War II," and Edwin Shane received a silver for "Philippines: The War Years 1939-1946."

MPHS at APS StampShow in Providence

The Society shared a booth with the Universal Ship Cancellation Society near the APS Affiliates area during the American Philatelic Society show in Providence, R.I. on August 24-27.

On Friday a joint meeting of the two groups was held with 20 people present. After each one introduced themselves and their collecting interests, John Johnson of the American Air Mail Society spoke about airmail in the branch post offices in the Philippines. U.S. stamps were used for airmail and he described covers from USS Blackhawk, USS Mindanao, and many other covers from the 1935-1939 period. The Navy and Marines had four military post offices at Cavite and other locations in the Philippines during this period.

On Saturday an MPHS meeting was led by vice president Myron Fox. Again the 18 attendees introduced themselves and Myron mentioned the officers and directors of the society. He then circulated books and pamphlets from his personal military postal history library, pointing out the good points about each item and indicating whether it was out of print or possibly still available from literature dealers.

[Ed note: the 1999 volume (four editions) of this journal was entered in the literature competition at the APS show, where it received a silver medal. I consider the award a tribute to the many authors who contributed articles to that volume.]

MPHS at MILCOPEX

The Military Postal History Society held its regional meeting in Milwaukee, September 15-17. The MILCOPEX show committee went all out for the society and thirteen military related exhibits were in the frames. The exhibit awards appear below. The organizing committee prepared a cachet and pictorial postmark with a military theme.

On Saturday the board of directors held a meting chaired by vice-president Myron Fox. The APO directory is now sold out and plans are underway to update the work and release it over several years in a number of volumes. Other pending publications are on the SeaBees and PT boats. The by-laws were reviewed with some minor changes discussed. The term of office for officers and directors will be changed to coincide with our fiscal year of January 1 – December 31. A number of other housekeeping items were discussed including the need for a new logo for MPHS.

Later on Saturday a membership meeting was held at which Myron Fox presented a talk on censorship in World War II. He showed examples of various censor markings, resealing tapes, and inserts placed by inspection clerks in envelopes before they were forwarded.

Heavenly Bodies

Little has been written about Japanese submarine commanders of World War II. Few authors have questioned the bravery or skills of those officers, but many have observed how poorly the Japanese naval high command understood the appropriate strategic use of submarines, and how their potential was often wasted on trivial missions.

The top-scoring Japanese submarine commander of World War II was LT Takaichi Kinashi, who commanded HIJMS I-19 during the early struggles over the island of Guadalcanal. On Sept. 15, 1942, in one of the greatest submarine shots of the war, he managed to hit the aircraft carrier USS Wasp, the battleship North Carolina and the destroyer O'Brien with one single spread of his legendary long-lance torpedoes. Wasp was sunk, O'Brien foundered on her way back home, and North Carolina was forced back to Pearl Harbor for lengthy repairs.

Kinashi eventually transferred to HIJMS I-29 and continued his predations. However, in the summer of 1944 he was ordered to make a long voyage to Germany to bring back a cargo of important German technical documents. British code-breakers at Bletchley Park intercepted German radio traffic detailing the planned route for the submarine around Africa and India, and passed the "Ultra" information to the Americans. Admiral Lockwood sent a wolfpack of submarines to intercept, and on July 26 USS Sawfish ambushed I-29 while she was crossing the South China Sea four days out of Singapore en route back to Japan. It fell to Sawfish's commander, Alan Banister, to torpedo and sink the enemy submarine, surely a melancholy task for any submarine captain.

Although Kinashi's prime targets were military ships, merchant ships also became victims of his torpedo attacks. One

of these was SS William Williams, a 15,000-ton cargo vessel of the Isthmian Steamship Lines. On May 2, 1943, while operating near Suva Fiji, William Williams was devastated by one of Kinashi's torpedoes. Apparently Kinashi assumed that the Liberty Ship was doomed, for he quickly cleared the area. Her crew made the same assumption and took to the lifeboats. However, the workers at Permanente Metals Yard No. 2 in Richmond, Calif. built sturdy ships, and when she refused to sink, her crew climbed back aboard and renewed their calls for help. Eventually a tug arrived and towed the vessel to Auckland, New Zealand.

It was understood that the government assumed responsibility when merchant ships carrying military cargoes suffered battle damage, and William Williams was soon reclaimed by the War Shipping Administration. The WSA transferred the ship to the Navy on Nov. 6, 1943, and the Navy named her Venus, following the custom of

naming cargo vessels for "heavenly bodies." USS Venus (AK-135), with only temporary repairs, was towed across the Tasman Sea to Sydney, Australia, where she was reduced to "In Service" on Dec. 4, 1943 for repairs.

Returning the ship to serviceable condition turned out to be a long and drawn-out process, lasting more than nine months. There were higher priorities in the busy port of Sydney, a dockyard strike, and difficulty in obtaining suitable spare parts. It was almost the end of October 1944 before she was ready for service. It was during this long tedious period of repairs that Chief Glenn Horner sent this request for an absentee ballot to his hometown, Grandview, Washington.

Finally loaded with cargo, *Venus* made her first port call at Manus in the Admiralty Islands in November 1944. She arrived there just in time to witness the explosion of the ammunition ship *Mount Hood. Venus* responded by sending blood plasma for the wounded. As the following weeks became months, she played an important role in providing supplies for the invasions of the various islands of the Philippines. In February she carried the 109th Fleet Hospital and the 544th Construction Battalion to the Philippines. She worked in the Southwest Pacific until the end of the war, returning to the States for decommissioning in 1946. After more than a decade in the reserve fleet at Suisun Bay, Calif., she was scrapped in 1961.

Glenn Horner probably was not pleased with the response to his request for an absentee ballot, by the way. Markings on the card indicate that city hall in Grandview, Washington had no record of him as a registered voter.
