# Happy Holidays!

Over the years seasonal greeting cards and similar messages sent *to* servicemen stationed overseas have far outnumbered those that they sent back home, although far more of the ones sent back home have survived the years. When the Army announced in 1944 that servicemen overseas had to specifically request something before it could be sent to them in a parcel, the rule inspired cards like this one. How well they worked is anyone's guess.

In 1943 Corporal James Willis, stationed with the 943rd Ordnance Motor Vehicle Distribution Company in Oran, Algeria (then still a part of France) found this tiny seasonal card to send to the pastor at St. Stephen's Episcopal church back home. The French inscription, "Heureuse Année," would best be colloquially translated "Happy New Year," although the practical French see no need to include the term "new" when wishing someone a Good Year.

"Heureuse" might also be translated as blessed, blissful, delightful, fortunate, lucky, pleasing and successful. May all of these terms apply to your endeavors in the coming year.


# The German V-Weapons Offensive

The German flying bomb (in German, Vergeltungswaffe 1), also known as FZG-76 or "Doodlebug," was the first successful guided weapon. The V-1 missile was the simplest and smallest structure which the Germans had been able to evolve capable of carrying three-quarter of a ton of high explosive and sufficient fuel to enable it to fly. Had the Battle of Britain gone well for the Germans, the need for speedy exploitation of a practical Flying Bomb would not have ben necessary. The construction and testing of the V-1 became of great urgency to the Germans after the defeat of the Luftwaffe in 1940.

The idea of a flying bomb was first proposed to the Luftwaffe in 1939 but turned down. The Luftwaffe revisited the concept in June 1942 and approved the development of an inexpensive flying bomb that possessed a range of around 150 miles. To protect the project from Allied spies, it was designated "Flak Ziel Geraet" (anti-aircraft target apparatus). Design of the weapon, code name Kirschkern (cherry stone), was overseen by Robert Lusser of Fieseler and Fritz Gosslau of the Argus engine works. Development of the flying bomb progressed at Peenemunde where the V-2 rocket was being tested. Beginning in January 1941 the V-1 pulse jet engine was tested on a variety of craft, including automobiles and an experimental attack boat known as the Tornado. The engine made its first flight aboard a Gotha 145 aircraft on April 30, 1941. The V-1 guidance system used a simple autopilot to regulate altitude and airspeed. Operating power for the gyroscope platform and the flight control actuators was provided by two large spherical compressed air tanks which also pressurized the fuel tank.

The first complete V-1 airframe was delivered August 30, 1942 and the first glide test flight was October 28, 1942 at Peenemunde from under a Focke Wulf KW-200 aircraft. The first powered trial as on December 10, 1942 launched from beneath an He-111 aircraft. Work continued through the spring of 1943 and in May 1943 Nazi officials decided to place the V-1 into production while operational units were formed and launch sites constructed. While many of the V-1's test

flights had commenced from aircraft, the weapon was intended to be launched from ground sites through use of ramps fitted with steam or chemical catapults. The V-1 production was spread across Germany and many were built by slave-labor at the underground plant near Nordhausen.

The Germans also made a manned version of the V-1 and in late 1943 conducted experiments in which pilots would

point their target and bail out. The V Gruppe (also known as Leonidas Staffel) of Kampfgeschwader 200, a secret Luftwaffe bomber unit, was designated for this mission. Many German officers did not like the scheme, and in October 1944 a new commander named Werner Baumbach (Figure 1) was appointed to KG 200. Mass production of the converted V-1 had begun, but the entire program was stopped due to intervention from Werner Baumbach.

The original code name of the Allies campaign against the German long-range weapons program was "Bodyline," but that was replaced by the code name "Crossbow" on November 15, 1943. The Peenemunde installation was attacked by RAF Bomber Command for the first time in August 1943. For the air defense of London, Bristol and the Solent against the V-1's, more than 1,330 guns were de-

ployed in January 1944 and approximately 1,750 barrage balloons around London. Select units of Fighter Command (No 150 Wing RAF) operating high speed fighters were also ready to attack the V-1's. The Royal Observer Corps fired "snowflake" illuminating rocket flares from the ground to identify V-1 flying bombs to RAF fighters.

The Germans began the construction of the V-1 sites in France in the spring of 1943. The construction sites employed German specialists, paid French and Belgian volunteers as well as slave-labor. Prisoners were also used from the Buchenwald concentration camp. The Germans realized that the first constructions could be easily located and decided to abandon them and use them as a decoy to Allied bombers. Around a hundred new bases, comprising few permanent and easily camouflaged buildings were landings in Normandy, the V-1 campaign against London began on June 13, 1944. During the period June 13 to September 1, 1944, around 9,000 V-1's were catapulted from Northern France to London and 2,300 reached their target. The V-1 sites in France were repeatedly attacked by U.S. bombers from 8<sup>th</sup> Air Force. Bomb Group 487 (Figure 2) attacked the sites on July 6 and August 2, 1944.


The liberation of Northern France by Allied forces at the beginning of September 1944 put and end to the first great V-1 offensive against London. Later in the war the launchings of V Weapons, including the V-2 rocket, continued from bases in Holland. V-2 rockets against London were launched from a base at Wassenaar, Holland. During the last phase of the V-1 offensive the Germans launched as many as 9,000 V-1's against continental targets, particularly the Belgian port of Antwerp and the city of Liège, Belgium.

#### V-1 Units

Heeres Flak Artillerie Abteilung 294 was raised at Wiener-Neustadt on May 1, 1943 and came under command of Höherer Artillerie Kommandeur 191 V Waffen, Fdesignated for V-1 launchings. The unit moved to France and was stationed around Calais, Northern France but exact location not known. After the evacuation in August 1944 the unit returned to Reid, Germany. The unit used Fieldpost FP 57113, and 57113C was assigned to 2<sup>nd</sup> Battery (Figure 3).

Flak Regiment 155 (W) was raised at Zinnowitz-Zempin on August 15, 1943 with 9 Abteilungen (sections). The I Abteilung with four batteries moved to France and was stationed at Lumbres under the command of Höherer Artillerie Kommandeur 191 V Waffen. The I Abteilung returned to

Remagen, Germany in September 1944 and moved to Sauerland in November 1944. It was transferred to Holland in December 1944 to continue the launching of V-Weapons. The I Abteilung used Fieldpost FP L54676 assigned to 4<sup>th</sup> Battery (Figure 4).

# The MIT Radiation Lab and the Atomic Bomb

## **Background**

In June 1940, the Scientific Observer to President Roosevelt (Vannevar Bush), president of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT, Karl Compton) and the president of Harvard University (James Conant) met with Roosevelt to propose, and the president agreed to, a National Defense Research Committee (NCRC) to oversee scientific Research and Development (R&D) relating to national defense. Subsequently, on June 28, 1941, President Roosevelt signed Executive Order 8807 which created the Office of Scientific Research and Development (OSR&D) as part of the Office of Emergency Management. The OSR&D replaced the NDRC and similar organizations. Its director was Vannevar Bush and he reported directly to President Roosevelt. The OSR&D was responsible for all military-related R&D programs, including the development of Radar, the Atomic Bomb, etc., and had an almost unlimited budget.

## The MIT Radiation Laboratory

The MIT Radiation Laboratory (RadLab) really got its start when in September 1940 the British gave the Americans the 10-centimeter cavity magnetron which was the key to microwave radar (RAdio Detection And Ranging). By the end of 1940, the RadLab was up and running on the campus of MIT. After the OSR&D was established, the RadLab "reported" to that organization. It is interesting to note that the name "Radiation Laboratory" was chosen to be intentionally deceptive, giving the impression that they were working on nuclear physics.

The RadLab was headed by Lee DuBridge and by late 1945 he was responsible for almost 3,900 research and support staff. Over 100 different radar systems were developed by the RadLab during World War II. It is said that the atomic bomb ended World War II, but that radar won the war. Bell Labs was also actively involved in the development of radar sys-

ems

The RadLab officially terminated its operations effective December 31, 1945; however, certain R&D projects continued until June 30, 1946. After that the lab was known as the MIT Research Laboratory of Electronics.

## Cambridge, Massachusetts

As discussed above. the Office of Scientific Research and Development was the umbrella organization for all warrelated R&D. Figure 1 shows a cover dated Dec, 7, 1944 from the OSR&D to Dr. John Trump at the RadLab. Dr. Trump was a RadLab physicist but was mostly involved in administration. In 1944 he became the head of the RadLab operations in England.

Shown in Figure 2 is a registered cover dated Dec. 4, 1944 from the OSR&D sent to Dr. DuBridge, the Director of the RadLab. Can any of our members explain why this cover has 4 cents postage? Under postal regulations, registered mail from government agencies in Wash-

ington, D.C. was sent at no charge.

The RadLab was involved with various branches of the military. Figure 3 shows a registered cover dated Dec. 3, 1944 from the Air Corps at Robins Field, Georgia to the RadLab. Shown in Figure 4 is a registered cover dated Dec. 4, 1944 from the Navy Department to the Director of the RadLab. Figure 5 shows a registered cover dated July 7, 1944 from the Bureau of Ships to the Navy Liaison Officer at the RadLab.

### England — British Branch RadLab

In addition to its main facility in Cambridge, Mass., the RadLab had a facility at Malvern Hills, England (APO 121), where mostly applications work and training were conducted. Shown in Figure 6 is an airmail registered cover from the British Branch Radiation Lab (BBRL) to the Associate Director of the RadLab in Cambridge.




Figure 8. A postcard mailed May 31, 1945 from APO 121 to a civilian in Cambridge, Mass. The return address is now given as BBRL-MIT (British Branch Radiation Lab—Massachusetts Institute of Technology).

Figures 7 and 8 show an interesting correspondence between a civilian, Jean Gildutis in Malvern Hills and Bob Briggs, a civilian who worked at the Rad-Lab in Cambridge, and was also a collector and early USCS member (#394), who was responsible for saving the RadLab covers I have in my collection. The postcard shown in Figure 7, mailed May 21, 1945, states that Jean is back in England and "Seems I'm to work here [at the British Branch RadLab] for a few weeks & then back to the States. Many of our [RadLab] people have already left."Figure 8 is a card mailed May 31, 1945 from Jean stating "Place is really closing...." Her return address is now given as BBRL-MIT. Note that Jean's full signature appears at the bottom of the face of each card as her "self censorship" that the contents were OK.

## The Atomic Bomb




Figure 9. An airmail cover dated October 4, 1944 from PO Box 1663, Santa Fe, New Mexico to Dr. DuBridge at the RadLab. Note that the domestic airmail postage was 8 cents. This cover is overfranked by one cent, probably because they did not have a two-cent stamp handy.

I have saved the best for last. Figure 9 is an airmail cover dated Oct. 4, 1944 from PO Box 1663, Santa Fe, New Mexico to Dr. DuBridge at the RadLab. PO Box 1663 was the main undercover address for the Manhattan Project, which developed the Atomic Bomb at the Los

Alamos facility in New Mexico. So why were the Atomic Bomb people corresponding with the RadLab people? Russ Carter suggested that it might relate to a radar proximity fuse for the Little Boy and Fat Man Atomic bombs. A Google search turned up Reference 7 entitled "The Swords of Armageddon: U.S. Nuclear Weapons Development Since 1945." In Part V, "Arming and Fusing, Techniques and Equipment," the article explains that the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory

(LASL) requested that the RadLab "design and construct an X-band proximity fuse with a 30-inch diameter parabolic reflection located in the nose of the bomb." This was a most "top secret" project and its funding was hidden under an existing radar development project.

Although we cannot know for certain, I believe that this cover contained correspondence related to the development of the radar proximity fuse used in the Atomic Bombs. In any

event, official mail from PO Box 1663 is a great addition to my collection.

# Mail to Movie Stars - An Update

## Foreign Pilots Trained in U.S. During WW II

In the winter 2013 edition issue we covered fan mail to movie stars from Chinese and French trainee pilots during WW II. The references we cited made no mention of pilots from Yugoslavia being trained. A recent acquisition (right) adds fan mail from a member of the Yugoslavian Air Force who was trained in Tucson and was a member of the 62<sup>nd</sup> Bomber Squadron.

It was not addressed to a particular star. This happens at times and the envelope has to be opened to make sure it gets to the right star. It also shows the common misconception that all studios were in Hollywood. Universal Studios was in Universal City and a pencil notation forwards it to the proper location.

The 62<sup>nd</sup> Bombardment Group was formed in 1941 as a B-17 Flying Fortress heavy bomber group and fought in the Pacific theater, operating from the Philippines. After the Clark AFB fell it was reformed at Davis-Monthan Field in Tucson, Arizona. In 1942 it became a B-24 Liberator heavy bomber Operational Training Unit under the 2<sup>nd</sup> Air Force. It trained new unit and replacement crews until heavy bomber training ended in April 1944.<sup>1</sup>

Davis-Monthan Field is currently a storage site (boneyard) for obsolete aircraft.

In 1940, Britain provided military aid to the Royal Yugoslav Air Force (WKJ) and they resisted the German invasion in April 1941 but they could not hold back the German



air power. Some of the Yugoslav Air Force escaped to Greece and Russia and Egypt to continue the fight. But for all practical purposes they did not exist anymore. Yugoslav Partisans were able to form an Air Force in 1943 from aircraft captured from German and Croatian Air Force units.<sup>2</sup>

The envelope shown is dated Jan. 29 1943 and perhaps Lt. Pajitch was sent to the U.S. to be trained for the newly formed Partisan Yugoslav Air Force.

# Face of Defense: Deployed Airmen Provide Morale-lifting Mail

SOUTHWEST ASIA, Sept. 27, 2013 - Nothing can compare to the feeling a deployed service member gets when he or she receives a care package from a loved one back home.

But packages don't just appear out of thin air at the 379th Air Expeditionary Wing here — it takes a team of postal services airmen working every day to ensure all mail items get to the right place.

"Whether you are saying hello, getting goodies from home, sending Christmas gifts, seeing pictures of your baby for the first time or simply paying a bill — mail makes that happen," said Air Force Tech. Sgt. Scott Boucher, the 379th Expeditionary Communications Squadron's postal affairs noncommissioned officer-in-charge who's deployed from Joint Base Langley-Eustis, Va. With the largest mail volume in the U.S. Air Forces Central Command area of responsibility, the two post offices here receive anywhere from 500 to 1,500 packages of incoming and outgoing mail, while serving an average of 75 walk-in customers each day.

"Another thing that makes this post office different is we are open seven days a week," said Air Force Staff Sgt. Eugene Dolor, a 379th ECS postal specialist deployed from Ramstein Air Base, Germany.

Each day, postal services airmen procure the mail for the base. It is one of the very few locations that have a mail control activity with staff that goes to the airport every night to pick up mail. "As soon as the incoming truck arrives, we unload and scan the parcels," Dolor explained. "From there, we divide the mail by unit. Unit mail clerks come through the next day to pick up and disperse the mail."

Holiday seasons are especially busy for the post offices here as the mail volume can double or even triple in size. To alleviate the impact, the post offices enlist the help of volunteers to assist with the nightly sorting process.

"Volunteering is important because it gives people a chance to be a part of something so crucial," Boucher said. "Not to mention there aren't too many jobs in the Air Force where others can help out; you don't see the 'regular Joe' helping civil engineers build walls or charge heating ventilation air conditioning systems."

The hard work of the postal services airmen and the continued support of volunteers helps to keep the flow of what Boucher noted is the most important function of the post offices here.

"Delivering morale," he said. "And keeping our military, Department of Defense employees, and contractor brothers and sisters from all branches of the military, to include other nations, connected with their families."

# **Experiences of an AEF Air Service Pilot POW**

Bill Brierton provides this remarkable report of an AEF Air Service pilot who crashed behind enemy lines in 1918 and was taken Prisoner of War. Brierton reports that LT Crawford was the only officer from the state of Delaware to be taken POW in World War I.

flying a DeHaviland 4 with a Liberty motor and operating from the Maulan Airdrome.

At eleven o'clock on the above date, I was ordered to perform a reconnaissance in the vicinity of Dampvitoux, Southeast of Lake Lachaussee. On this day the clouds were low and thick, the weather inclement, with a very strong Southeast wind. I crossed the lines at Verdun, flying as high as the clouds would permit.

On the completion of reconnaissance, my motor gradually heated up and slowed down so that I could make no headway against the wind. The gasoline line from the tank to the motor was also leaking badly. The motor finally cut out and I landed east of Pont-a-Mousson, seven kilometers from the lines. I nosed over and crashed on landing.

I landed beside a German camp and was almost immediately surrounded. No demonstration was made by the German soldiers. They allowed me to do what I could for my observer, Second Lieutenant M. O'Toole who had been shot through the leg with a machine gun bullet and thrown clear of the machine in the crash. I was uninjured except for minor cuts and bruises.

I was separated from my Observer, my flying clothes were taken away and I was confined in an old church. Lieutenant O'Toole was taken to a hospital. I was in the church two hours when a German flying officer came in and invited me to his squadron dinner. He had examined my plane and told me that the motor was badly shot up by ground fire. I went to the squadron under guard and there was examined by a German intelligence officer. I refused to answer all questions. I slept at this that night and left the next morning (13<sup>th</sup>) for Strassburg.

I arrived there at 10 o'clock that night, riding in third class carriages. A slight hostile demonstration by the populace there was instantly quelled by the guards. I was taken to an old fortress and placed in a cell with R.A.F. pilots and one American. We discovered dictaphones hidden in the room. I was examined by an intelligence officer. He inquired the number in my squadron, telling me that he had no connection with the intelligence but merely wanted to know so he could put me with friends in a permanent camp. I refused to answer. My Sam Browne belt was taken from me there.

On or about the sixth of October, I was taken to Landshut in Bavaria (fourth class carriages) in company with thirteen other American flying officers. Here we were given a thorough physical examination and asked if we had any complaints. I had none, except the shortness of food. Here we were vaccinated once and inoculated five times.

On or about the sixteenth of October, I was taken to Villingen in Baden which was a permanent camp. Here we received some Red Cross food, clean Red Cross underwear, etc. After the Armistice, we formally protested against being detained and on the twenty-third of November we were allowed to walk about the city from the hours of 9-12 A.M. and 2-6 P.M. Many troops were passing through the town but no efforts were made to molest any of the prisoners.

On the twenty-seventh of November all of the Americans imprisoned at Villingen were taken to Constance in first class carriages. Here we lived in a hospital and the food was much better hitherto.

On the thirtieth of November while were taken across Switzerland (first class carriages) via Zurich, Berne, Lausanne and Geneva and rejoined the American forces at Bellegarde.

#### French-type Steel CDS inscribed MPES (A3001)

## ERD on July 24, 1918 at APO 729

In order to implement the new nomenclature as early as possible, a new series of postmarks was ordered from local manufacturers. These were French-designed single-ring devices without killers and inscribed "U.S. Army Post Office MPES" with the APO number at the bottom of the dial. These were placed in use at most of the 700 number APOs. The latest date seen is in August 1919. [See table and illustrations, pages 12-13.]

#### Single-Circle with "M" excised (A3002)

#### Observed in February 1919

At APO 746, the MPES cancel was altered to remove the "M". Used only for a brief period until the new device arrived.

#### **Double-Circle MPES CDS with star (A4001)**

#### ERD on Aug. 14, 1918 at APO 702

In addition, postmarks of an entirely new design were ordered locally. These involved a large double-circle device with the name "Military Postal Express Service" spelled out in full, with the APO number near the top and a star at the bottom of the dial. It was the most widely used as compared to of any of the other AEF postmarks, including at nearly all of the 700 and 800 series APOs, and arguably the most attractive. It was still in use as late as 1922. [See table and illustrations, pages 14-15.]

#### Double-Circle MPES CDS without star (A4022) ERD in September 1918

A variety of this marking appeared at two post offices: the CPO (Central Post Office APO 902 at Bourges) and at 731A. It had larger lettering which did not allow any room for the star.

## Double-Circle MPES CDS with asterisks (A4101)

#### ERD on Sept. 21, 1918 at APO 711

This was a similar device but MPES is abbreviated and APO number is shown at the bottom of the dial with asterisks before and after. It was used at a substantial number of APOs in the 700 series until June 1919.

## MPES in Small Letters with thin ring (A4010)

## ERD April 1919

This variation was used only at APO 702 and is clearly a different device than the other MPES cancels. The lettering is small and the space between the rings is quite narrow. Reported as used from April to July 1919.

#### **Double-Circle PES CDS (A4201)**

#### ERD Nov. 28, 1918 at APO 918

The old MPES cancels apparently remained in use at the 700 and 800 series APOs while the new PES postmarks were supplied to the 900 series APOs, where they were used from late 1918 until May of 1919.

#### Large Circle U.S.- A.P.O. No.901 (A4302)

ERD Sept. 20, 1918

This device was reported used from September to December 1918 at APO 901 in Milan.

### Posta Americana A.P.O. 901 (A4301)


ERD Dec. 15, 1918


This device was inscribed in Italian and used from December 1918 to April 1919 in Milan.

Actual dates of operation of offices may differ from the dates given. Some numbers may be Mailing Addresses Only rather than representing an operating post office.

For some time now the effective date of most actions have been the publication date of that issue of the *Postal Bulletin*. Exceptions would be marked with an asterisk\*.

A busy quarter, at least for the staff at the Military Postal Service Agency. All of the announcements say "close," but that does not represent a significant withdrawal of overseas forces.

The routine ones: APO 09009 was the south-side post office on Ramstein Air Base in Germany (the north-side office, APO 09012, remains open). APO 09229 was the Army-Air Force Exchange Service Central Credit Payment facility in Kaiserlautern, Germany. FPO 09844 was assigned to the NATO Combined Air Operations Center in Larissa, Greece. APO 09237 was used for the Casual Mail Directory at Darmstadt, Germany. In military terms, "casual" often refers to troops awaiting a new assignment, but the recent announcement that all mail addressed to overseas military post offices must have full nine-digit ZIP Codes apparently means that anyone sent to an overseas location must have at least some assignment to get mail.

Among the contingency codes in the Middle East, APO 09311 was at Karshi-Khanabad, Qarshi, Uzbekistan, while APO 09339 was in Ashgabat, Turkmenistan, surely two of the most obscure places at which an APO ever operated. FPO 09312 was at Forward Operating Base Kalsu Nasair-Lafitah, Iraq, APO 09313 was in Al-Tadji, Iraq, and APO 09314 was

in Salemo, Afghanistan. APO 09348 was used by the First Cavalry in Baghdad, when on maneuvers, and FPO 09380 was used by the 2nd Brigade Combat Team of the 3rd Infantry Division in Baghdad. FPO 09387 was at Camp Fallujah, Iraq. APO 09394 was used by the 1st Infantry Division in Fallujah, Iraq. APO 09374 was assigned to the 278th Expeditionary Signal Battalion in Baghdad.

Someone in the Navy section at the Military Postal Service Agency has been doing some housecleaning, and apparently found some codes whose discontinuations never were announced. FPO 09545 had been assigned to the submarine tender USS Emory S. Land while she was based at La Maddalena, Italy. She left that assignment in 2006 and has been stationed at Diego Garcia island in Indian Ocean since 2010. FPO 09549 belonged to the helicopter carrier USS Saipan, which was decommissioned in 2007 and is now scrap metal. FPO 09557 similarly belonged to sister carrier USS Nassau, decommissioned in 2011. FPO 34095 was used by the aircraft carrier USS John F. Kennedy when she was based at Mayport, Florida, until she was decommissioned in 2007. FPO Codes 09503, 09508, 09509 and 09511 were reserved for mobile Marine Corps units operating out of the East Coast, but apparently the Navy has decided it no longer has any need for them. Similarly, FPOs 96613 and 96614 had been set aside for use by Marine Corps mobile units on temporary maneuvers across the Pacific.

When the Military Postal Service Agency expanded the Navy ZIP Code system in 1980, it assigned a set of codes to be used by alphabetic groups of small Navy ships that don't get enough mail to need their own unique five-digit code. FPO 96687 was reserved for ships in the Pacific whose names begin with the letter Z. The last of these was *USNS Zeus*, a cablelaying ship that moved to the Atlantic last year to try to improve the communications link between Guantanamo Bay and Florida. Although the code is consequently left inactive, it presumably remains reserved for such possible use in the future.

The two mystery codes are 09866 and 34044, both opened last spring but of which nothing more has been heard since. Pirate chasers in Africa and drug runners in the Caribbean?

# **BOOK REVIEWS**

Swissair 1944 Flights

Swissair Special Flights of 20 September 1944: Postal History Perspective by Charles J. LaBlonde. 36 pages, 8 ½ by 11 inches, card covers, saddle stitched, self-published by the author, Colorado Springs CO, 2013. Collectors usually attribute the Swissair flights of September 20, 1944 to invented or created circumstances, which in a sense is true. However, the author provides the background that led up to these events and presents postal history aspects of the flights so that collectors can better appreciate what was accomplished.

Swissair was formed in 1931 with the merger of Ad Astra Aero and Balair. By 1939 it established several domestic and foreign routes and acquired and maintained a number of aircraft. In August 1939 Swissair service came to a sudden halt when Germany closed France and Germany to civilian air traffic. The airline decided to cancel both domestic and foreign flights, leaving a company requiring maintenance but having no income.

In 1940 some effort was made to furnish flights to Italy and Spain but these disappeared when Italy joined the war. Thereafter Germany permitted a limited amount of traffic to carry mail between it and Switzerland and then arrangements were made for Swissair personnel to perform repair and maintenance on German craft. This provided some income but the r&m was terminated at the beginning of 1944.

A business without income cannot survive and the prognosis for Swissair was very bleak. In August 1944 one Swissair flight from Zürich to Stuttgart resulted in loss of its DC-2 when it was mistakenly destroyed at the airport by an Allied bombing mission. However, the Swiss crew was saved and returned to Switzerland. A short time later another Swiss

DC-2 landed at Stuttgart and the airport was again attacked. The neutral markings were observed and the DC-2 was not touched although the Germans suffered loss of life and severe facilities destruction. The Swiss plane and its crew returned safely to Zürich. The Zürich/Stuttgart route was abandoned August 16, 1944.

By September the Swiss Postal Telegraph and Telephone agency (PTT) came to the rescue of the airline. First a set of four stamps were issued September 1 consisting of three airmail values and a special 1.50 Swiss francs stamp all marking the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of airmail service in the country. The 1.50 CHF value was designated for a series of flights and could be used only on those flights on September 20, 1944. Twelve legs of service took place among Zürich, Bern, Lausanne, and Geneva.

Special directional labels for each leg, marked "Jubiläums-Postflug," were applied to covers that were prepared and mailed in outer envelopes to designated collection points. The 1.50 CHF stamp paid for delivery to domestic and foreign addresses. If registration was required, it was paid by any other Swiss stamps available at the time. Arrival handstamps within Switzerland were applied to the front of the covers, but neither the outgoing nor arrival cancels had any time designation.

Author LaBlonde illustrates one or more of these special September 20 covers for each leg, and provides an analysis of rates as well as the number of covers carried on each leg. In addition to registered mail some examples with express labels and the required postage are shown. Covers sent to Germany and elsewhere in Europe were censored, with few exceptions. Other destinations shown include Belgium, Netherlands, Hungary, Sweden, England, Morocco, and the United States. The routing and rates are analyzed.

An appendix reproduces the Swiss PTT announcement of August 22, 1944 that spelled out the requirements for these special flights. A bibliography of sources concludes this booklet that tells an interesting story of interest to Swiss postal history and aerophilately. The Swiss postal service saved the national airline and enabled it to prepare for resumption of postwar operation.



# On the Show Circuit

[The purpose of this column is to bring to the attention of MPHS members the awards obtained in recent shows of exhibits that are basically about military postal history. This may include exhibits by non-members. While there are many non-military related exhibits by members, these are not recorded here.]

Eliot Landau won a gold at Minnesota Stamp Expo in Minneapolis in July with his "Classic France: Postal History of the Ceres and Napoleon Issues of 1849-75." His exhibit also received a gold at StampShow in Milwaukee in August. Other golds at that show include Robert Collins' "The Korean War," Kathryn Johnson's "America's Victory: World War II V-Mail 1942-1945" along with the APS 1940-1980 medal of excellence, and Andrew Mazzara's "British & Guernsey Stamps and their Use During German Occupation 1940-1945," which also received our MPHS award.

Several military exhibits were seen at the Omaha show in September. Steve Henderson won a silver and the MPHS award for "World War II Satellite Postal Groups of the 8<sup>th</sup> Air Force in England." Another silver and an AAPE award of honor went to Phil Miller for "German Afrika Corps during World War II." Phil also received a silver and the Women Exhibitors sterling achievement award for "Foreign Volunteers in the German Military," and another silver was taken by Carl Marks for "The Purple Heart," and a bronze went to Bob Hoff for "Mail Censoring at the Frankfurt Office."

Carl Marks received another silver along with the AAPE creativity award at INDYPEX in Indianapolis in September for his "The Purple Heart." Al Kugel won a vermeil for "The Prexies Go to War." At the same show a gold, the APS 1940-1980 medal of excellence, the APS research award, the MPHS award, and the show Reserve Grand award went to Janet Klug for "British Empire Anti-Communist Actions in the jungles of Malaya 1948-1960."

At the SESCAL show in Los Angeles in October, Louis Fiset received a silver along with an AAPE award of honor and the Women Exhibitors sterling achievement award for "Mail between USA and France 1939-1945." He received another silver together with the Ephemera Society award for "M.S. Gripsholm: Swedish Liner, Mercy Ship."

Randy Neil won a gold and the single frame grand at OKPEX in Oklahoma City in October for "Critical Adversity Mails in the American Civil War: Confederate Mail Crossing of Union-Blockaded Borders." The exhibit also received the U.S. Philatelic Classics Society medal and the MPHS award. At the same show Jim Cate won a gold and the APS pre-1900 medal of excellence for "General Banks Division."

## Philatelic Militaria

Oskar Sørensen discusses the Danish-German postal conditions during World War II in the September issue of *Posthistorisk Tidsskrift*, published by the Denmark Postal History Society. Examples of outgoing mail from Denmark to Sweden, USA, Germany and Czechoslovakia are shown as well as inbound items to Denmark from Germany bearing various censor markings. Paul Binney focuses on mail from U.S. military bases in Newfoundland during WW II that was handled by Newfoundland post offices, in the issue 3/2013 of *BNATopics*.

Jerome Jarnick describes the work of the Canadian Royal Air Force to train U.S. pilots early in WW II to ferry planes to Great Britain in the August issue of the newsletter of the Canadian Military Mail Study Group. Some correspondence related to the RAF Ferry Command is shown. David Whitely reports on the Thomas Cook scheme for sending mail to occupied countries in the August issue of *War Times*, published by the World War II Study Group of BNA.

Ken Lawrence offers examples of United States covers bearing markings that reflect on tragedies of World War II like internment camps, missing in action, captured, or killed in action in the September 16 issue of *Linn's Stamp News*. In his column on postcards in the August issue of Denmark's *Dansk Filatelistisk Tidsskrift*, Steffen Riis illustrates a number of view cards depicting the handling and transport of Schleswig prisoners of War during 1914-1919.

Svein Andersen begins a series on censorship in Denmark 1940-1947 in the September issue of *Norwegian War and Field Post Journal*. He illustrates the censor and pass marks of Copenhagen and Sønderborg and lists dimensions, rarity, color, date range of use and other comments.

# View from a B-17 Flying Fortress

18th of October 1944, Italy

Dear Miss Cotrael,

I just received a letter from Mom, saying that you have been quite ill for several weeks now, and that she had just been down to see you. Gosh but I'm sorry to hear that! I assure you, Miss Cotrael, that if prayers will do the trick, you are silverplated with them!

Mom says the weather back home now is positively beautiful, with the leaves all turning into a thousand different colors, and that "fally" smell of burning leaves in the air — gee but I used to love that season!

For the past week, we've had pretty nice weather over here, but before that, it rained for practically 24 hours a day, and this famed "Italian Mud" was ankle deep.

I hear from your niece, Barbara Mudgett of Cattaragus, quite a bit, and I sure think she is an awfully nice girl. Her looks and personality can't be beat, in my estimation.

The war news doesn't look very encouraging at the present moment, does it? I'm afraid the Germans are going to fight like madmen for every inch of their soil, taking an untold cost of the cream of American manhood, before they decide to call it quits. I have 19 combat missions over Germany and it's coordinates now, and I've had some pretty exciting trips so far.

The other day we went up to hit oil plants 120 miles south of Berlin, and to get there, we had to cross the Alps, and Miss Cotrael, I'm telling you I've never seen a more <u>beautiful</u> sight in all my life! The snow capped mountain peaks rose far above the layer of clouds at their base, like queens on a fleecy white rug. Then, down in the valley between the mountains, were peaceful little villages, surrounded by green grass, with maybe a lake or river beside them. Honestly, I couldn't believe that there was a horrible war of destruction going on just a few

miles from there. It's certainly a crazy old world!

Well, I just wanted you to know that I was thinking of you, and praying for you. Don't even think about writing, until you are completely better. I mean this!

John Elsen survived 54 missions over Germany as a ball turret and waist gunner in the B-17 Flying Fortress. He returned home safely to Salamanca, New York, where he became a respected businessman and civic leader until his death in 2010.
