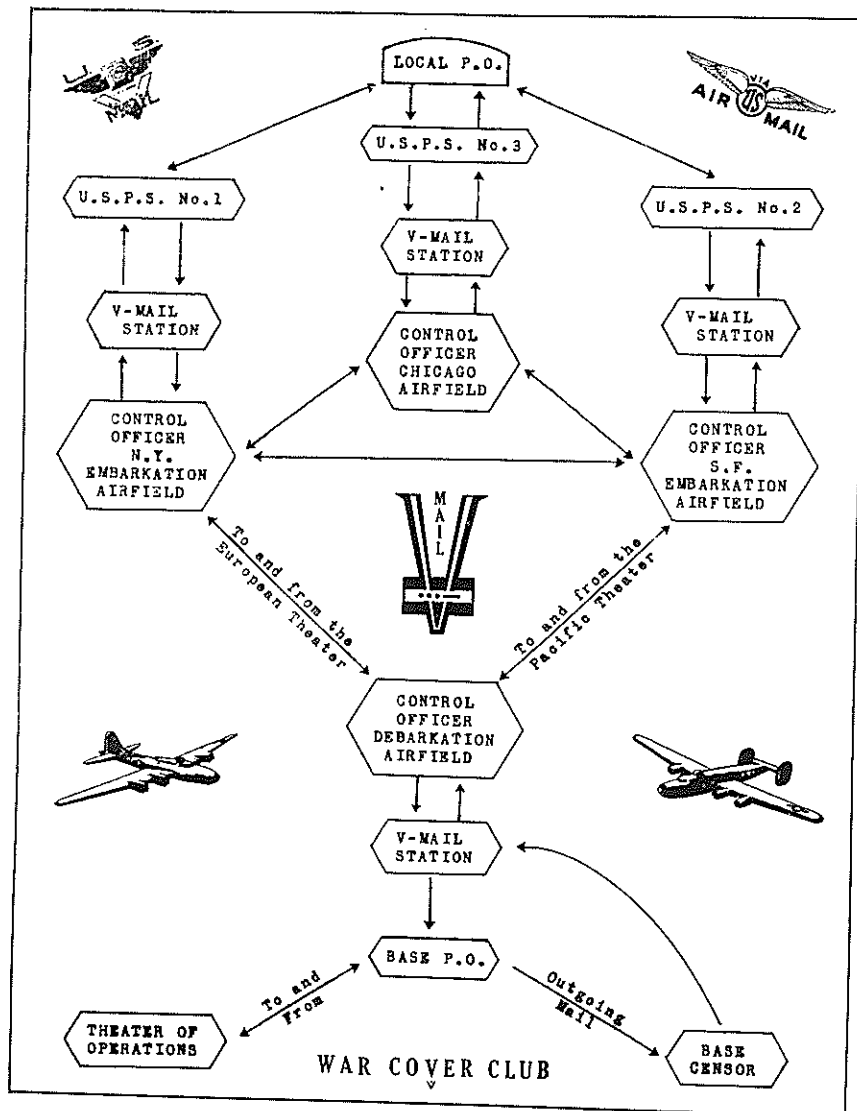

FLOW OF V-MAIL TO AND FROM THEATER OF OPERATIONS,
WORLD WAR II.



V-Mail received at U.S.P.S. No.1,2 or 3 and sent to a V-Mail Station for processing, was then delivered to the control officer at the local airfield.

V-Mail received at New York and addressed to the Pacific Theater was sent by the control officer, N.Y.Embarkation Airfield, to the control officer, S.F. Embarkation Airfield, the latter then arranged for its dispatch to the Pacific Theater. The control officer at S.F. similarly sent European Theater mail to the control officer at N.Y.

The control officer at Chicago Airfield sent V-Mail to N.Y. or S.F. according to its destination.

V-Mail from a Theater of Operations was routed in the same manner.

V-Mail from a Theater of Operations was sent to a V-Mail Sta. in the U.S. where it was processed before being transferred to U.S.P.S. Nos. 1, 2 or3.

V-Mail received overseas from the U.S; was not censored.

ONE OF MY FAVORITE COVERS

Our Editor has asked the members many times to send in a write-up of their favorite cover and I, like most of our membership, have not done so, due to various reasons one of them, some doubt as to whether what I might have to say, would be of interest to the rest of our group. Because I enjoy reading what our other members have to say along these lines, and further, the need to co-operate with our officers, I will make the attempt.

This cover and enclosure that I will attempt to describe, is not my favorite cover, it is but one of such a group and, as I am writing this just before Christmas, I thought it might be apropos. You see, it happens to be a Christmas Greeting mailed to me from the Pacific Area, by a friend who was a member of the 4th Marine Division and is dated in the early part of December, 1944.

The envelope is the usual Greeting Card size, postage prepaid with the current 6¢ air mail stamp. Attached to cover, next to the stamp is a gummed label, size 2" x 1 3/4", with the Marine insignia printed in blue in the upper left. To the right of this and below, is printed a large diamond in red. On this red square or diamond is printed a large "4" in yellow. Even with the bottom of the "4" is printed, "U.S. Marines 4th Division". Below this and to the left are three red stars in a vertical row, opposite the first star appears, "Roi-Namur", opposite the second star appears "Saipan", and opposite the third star is "Tinian", all are locations where this Division upheld so gloriously all the traditions of the fighting Marines.

The navy hand stamp in blue almost centers the red diamond with the big "4" and ties the stamp and label to the cover, in an eye arresting series of colors. The Navy Censor stamp in purple in lower left corner completes the cover.

The Christmas Greeting enclosed, is worthy of special mention. It is printed in three colors, blue, yellow and red. A gentle slope of yellow sand is shown in the bottom foreground and from this, at lower left, rears a stately palm tree against a background of dark blue star studded sky. At upper right is shown the large bright star of Bethlehem, its light bringing into sharp relief the palm tree and the Marine kneeling on the sands beneath, his rifle clasped in his right hand and his face turned toward the Star of Hope. At the bottom is printed two words in red, "Seasons Greetings".

Opening up the greeting, space is provided for message on one half of the sheet and here is written a short personal message from my friend. On the lower half is printed the Marine insignia in a light yellow and over this is printed the following verse:

From his post on the battle line,
In places far away-
A Marine kneels beneath the sign,
That lights the World on Christmas Day.

At the bottom right, "Marine 4th Division".

And, as I write this, just before another Christmas only six years later, our boys are again fighting for the cause of Right, "in places far away". Not on the hot sands or steaming jungle of some Pacific Islo, but in the cold forbidding lands of the Mongols and against still greater odds. We can but hope that some day soon, the Star of Bethlehem will shine down on a World at peace, that men will beat their swords into plowshares and live in peace with his neighbor in a free world. That is worth fighting for.

The German government established official postal systems (Dienstposten) in the territories which it overran and occupied in various parts of Europe during World War II. These postal facilities were intended for the use of the German civilian administration personnel in these districts, but they also frequently handled military and naval mail. The collector of German military postmarks cannot neglect them. Some of these official postal systems, such as those in Bohemia-Moravia and Poland, were heavily used; others, such as those in the Adriatic district and in the Lower Alps, were much less used and covers with their postmarks are not common. There were fourteen of these official postal systems. A pamphlet describing them has just come to hand. It is entitled Deutsche Dienstpost 1939-1945 and consists of twelve mimeographed pages. Two pages are devoted to descriptive and explanatory material; the rest contain a list of all the official post offices in each district or zone, with the opening date of each office. It appears to be a careful compilation. Anyone desiring a copy should communicate with Capt. Carl W. Ehlerding, Stuckenborstel uber Ottersberg, Bz. Bremen, British Zone, Germany. No price is indicated, but the cost cannot be great.

Somewhat covering a part of the same field is a French publication listing and describing the postmarks used by the German occupation forces in Lorraine. It is by Charles Michel and is entitled Les Cachets postaux de l'occupation allemande en Moselle. It is published by Editions Metz-Philatelie Marcel Perrier, Metz (Moselle), France, 1950. Price 600 francs.

POSTAL MARKINGS OF THE KOREAN CAMPAIGN

A new hand stamp is being used in Japan and Korea, at top of the dial, we find "ARMY AIR FORCE POSTAL SERVICE", to date we have seen APO 8 and APO 32 at the bottom of the dial, another sub-type shows no number in the cancel, APO appears at bottom, others of this latter type show APOs 8; 25; 264; 317; 468; 901-1; and, 1054, all below the date slugs.

APO 500 Gen. Hq. Far East Commd. at Tokyo. Another new handstamp seen with 500 below the date, and "Dai Itchi Br." at bottom of dial. This perhaps indicates mail from, or a unit of APO 500 is located at the Dai Itchi Bldg. Tokyo, which we assume to be Gen. MacArthur's office address. (see "LIFE" Nov. 27, P 127).

A letter from a Seoul Postal Officer, indicates the 51st Army Postal Unit is helping APO 8 which was established at Seoul about Oct. 1st. Return addresses seen on several covers, indicate some combat units are not using their WW-II APO numbers, examples are, HQ. X Corps APO 909; HQ. 3rd Inf. Div. APO 468; 2nd Inf. Div. APO 248. APO 970 used as a general number at Pusan. 972 at Inchon.

United Nation forces in Korea, other than U.S. and Korean, are; British 27th Inf. Commonwealth Brigade; 10th Philippine Bn. Combat Team; An advance Unit of Canadians; British Forces drawn from three units in England; Siamese Combat Team; Volunteer unit of Dutch Inf.; Turkish Forces, one Turkish Regt. along with the 2nd and 25th U.S. Divs. forms the IX US Corps; Enroute to Korea, are So. African AF unit; A Greek Inf. Brigade; A Belgian Bn.; A French Bn. and about 4,000 Australian Infantry force. WCC members having foreign philatelic contacts will have the advantage of securing covers from the above forces.

From new member Lane Blackburn, Jr. comes a letter in which he advises he is preparing an article on Censored Covers from China and he would like to hear from other members who might have any Civilian censored covers from China during WW II, with particular attention to mail to the U.S. As there are so many collectors of Chinese material, there must be a great amount of such material which would be helpful.

Secretary Tripp advised in a recent letter also that he is starting work on the listing of Prisoner of War Camps in all countries. While he has accumulated some information, there is much more that he requires, so why not check to your collections and see what you can send him in the way of data and material.

From WCC member Alfred Clement, Graz, Austria, which is in the American Zone, we have heard that he exhibited 250 war covers from 1747 to 1950 called "Field Mail from Maria Theresia to Korea" showing a history of the past 200 years of all countries. This proved most interesting and for this most unusual exhibit Mr. Clement was awarded a gold medal. Mr. Clement also sent a special card from the Exhibition.

In the next issue of The Bulletin we will include photo of the Army's Air Transport System showing routes and some of the 200 or more locations which received ordinary AM, V-Mail film and all "essential" official mail which was given top priority. This will complete the set of three charts showing methods and flow of mail.

The cancel chart is in its final stages. Great progress has been made but some cancel types are hard to find in good strikes, that is to say, good enough to photograph. Rising costs of paper, printing are proving an obstacle in the publication of our many planned projects. Please support your Club and its Donation Auctions. Additional funds will help speed up publishing of various other charts and lists.

Can anyone help Secy. Tripp with the loan of a much-needed publication called "Gateway to Victory" by J. W. Hamilton? Hope so. Get in touch with Mr. Tripp direct.

Starting in the next issue of The Bulletin, which (I cross my heart and hope to die) will appear on time, WCC Member Burge Thomas's article on Swiss Internment Camps in World War II will run serially. Watch for it as I think it will prove of great interest to all members.

Getting back to Korea, information is wanted as to whether any covers from Korea have been found showing any indications of being censored. Word from overseas states there is no censorship while statements made here claim high security control on the APO's in that country.

Those interested in propaganda leaflets of WW-II will certainly enjoy reading "Paper Bullets" by Leo J. Margolin, who was in the service and knows his subject.

We have been advised that old war maps are now being made into official size envelopes, maps of Germany, Austria, Czechoslovakia, India and of Pacific area have been noted. So you might examine the covers of 1950 more closely; such can be steamed open for display. Have fun!
