## AN INTERESTING A. P. O. COVER

Several years ago I was given a quantity of A. P. O. covers, all from the same correspondent, the corner care reading: H. Q. U. S. A. F., A. P. O. 601, % Postmaster, Miami, Fla., and in the Postmark #605 showed handstamped.

In glancing through these covers, I noticed one of them, which, in addition to the 605 also had #601 in the curve at the bottom of the cancellation, or a combination of two different numbers appearing in the postmark. I immediately sensed that I had a potentially good item, because I had been looking for #601 for a long time. This number had been considered extremely scarce and was missing from most A. P. O. collections.

How could that have happened? The records show that #601 was established in May, 1942 at Roberts Field, Liberia, near Fisherman's Lake which was a short distance from Monrovia, the Capital. A short time later another Air Base was built about 75 miles south of Fisherman's Lake near the Firestone plantations. Roberts Field was first designated as Sta. #14, A. T. C. Cent. A. F. Wing and later re-designated as A. T. C. Base Unit #1203 Cent. A. F. Div.

H. Q. where "High Brass" did their planning was probably located in some Hotel in town and mail from there went to Roberts Field where it was serviced before going on the plane. #605 was also located at Roberts Field, established on June 22, 1942; and ceased operations on March 19, 1946. Therefore Roberts Field was the main distribution point or Base Post Office where mail was serviced, cancelled and censored before being sent along to the United States, and other points.

Theorizing along these lines, it is quite possible that the Postal Clerk at #605 used a hand stamp which was intended to be sent to #601 for use, and placed the small steel square reading #605 in the proper place high up, not noticing that #601 was already there and in error cancelled the envelope. How many more were cancelled before he discovered his error is hard to tell.

If anyone has a similar cover, please notify me, so that we can keep a record of the number in existence.

This cover has been recorded and given a type number in the Official W. G. C. list of types.

FOR THE RECORD

From among the various covers that come to my attention, every now and then there is one that stands out from all the rest because of its unique character. One such is a personal letter cover mailed by an allied soldier during the War II campaign in North Africa.

The destination of this cover was Teheran, Iran, and in view of the frequent references to Teheran in the recent news reports, such a cover becomes an item of increasing interest from the standpoint of postal history.

As will be seen from the illustration the cover bore British postage but was cancelled by the "POSTE AUX ARMEES/B. P. M. 5" of the 1st Free French Division. Apparently it was mailed by a British soldier attached to the Free French Forces and was addressed to a lady in Teheran. It was despatched via the "POSTE AUX ARMEES/B. C. M. 4", located at Cairo, Egypt. A transit mark of this office on the back of the cover shows the date of August 26, 1942.

In chronological order, the next backstamp to be applied was one of the "INDIAN SECTION BASE OFFICE no. 7", dated Sept. 10, 1942, and finally there is a receipt date stamp inscribed, "F. P. O. #103 was at Teheran. Mr. Jaggor states that he had visited both of these places during his tour of service in the armed forces. He further adds this bit of interesting war history, "During the late war we despatched to North Africa, or Syria, many thousands of French who had been conscripted in the German army and captured on the Russian front, who were later handed over to us in Teheran, fitted out with British battle dress and forwarded on to Syria or North Africa.

I do not wish to infer that the cover mentioned above was mailed by one of these transferred French soldiers, since the date of the cover was much too early for that.

The Cancels Of The French Forces in Korea (CORRECTION)

After consultation of the former Mail Clerk of the French Bataillon in Korea, as well as the director of Central Army P. O. in Paris I want to bring you in the following a correction of my article in the March Bulletin.

The cancel; Poste aux Armes 222<sup>v</sup>, was used at the BCM-Paris (Central Army P. O.) for foreign mail of the French Troops in Indochina and Korea. (There never exist an APO 222!) Those Free-Mail, determined to foreign countries was stamped at costs of state and cancelled with "Poste aux Armes 222" or only, "Poste aux Armes" with star below.

It was also possible for the sender to forward stamped letters if he had stamps. Those letters were generally cancelled in Korea with "Poste aux Armes" (with or without star below).

My, now corrected supposition, that the APO 222 seems to be in Hanoi, was confirmed by the fact, that a cover from Indochina bore on the back as will the cancel of the APO 414 as the one from 222, where the difference of date only 1 day is; the cover couldn't be in Paris in one day! Therefore one of those dates was an error.

The cancel, Poste Militaire No. 560<sup>v</sup> is in use since about January 1952 at the French Bataillon in Korea.

In the following a small list of cancels used on Korea-Mail.

- 1st) = 1st periode from January, 1951 to December 31, 1951  
 2nd) = 2nd periode from January 1952 to today.

In the last two lines there is an printing error, right is: The cancel is a single-ring with the inscription POSTE NAVALE. This cover bears also a straight-line rubber stamp; AVISO LA GRANDIERE, in blue. This ship is back since the first quarter of 1952. Covers from this ship are very rare.

## SLOGAN CANCELS OF WORLD WAR II

When consorship was established (for the Atlantic Fleet in the spring of 1941, and for the Pacific Fleet on Dec. 7th), the "U. S. Navy" cancels issued were the same type as had been previously used, that is type 3 with slots between the three killer bars. During the war those type 3 cancels were replaced by the type 2 cancels with four killer bars, and we have had no more of the interesting type 3 cancels issued since.

Some of the most interesting wartime cancels are the slogan cancels. To what extent patriotically inspired, we shall probably never know. We do know, however, from the volume of cancels and the appearance of covers, that many of them were postally used for considerable periods of time. The return address is not proof of the office of use, but it is evidence, and when there are several covers with the same slogan cancel, and the same return address, we can assume that address is the office of use.

I have divided my slogans into the following groups:

Here is my check-list of bond slogans. All these are type 3z except the last. I shall be glad to report any additional examples brought to my attention by readers. If there is sufficient interest, perhaps the editor will permit me to list the other groups.

## U. S. MILITARY CANCELS ON BRITISH & COLONIAL POSTAGE

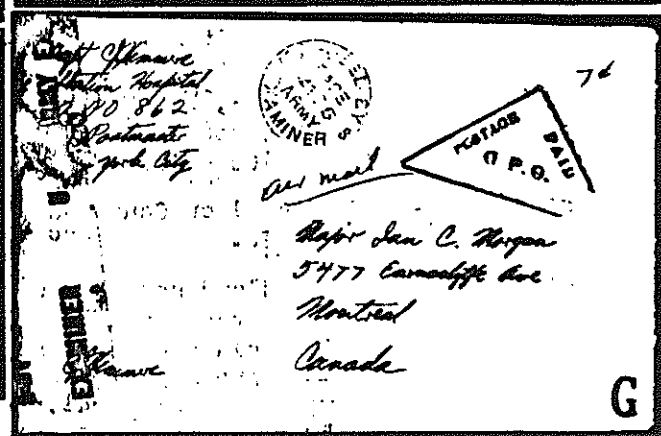
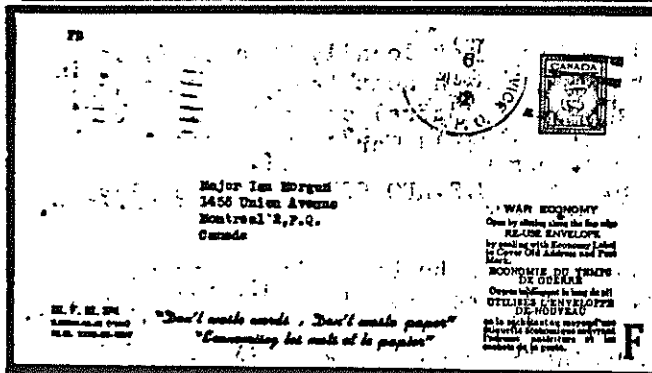
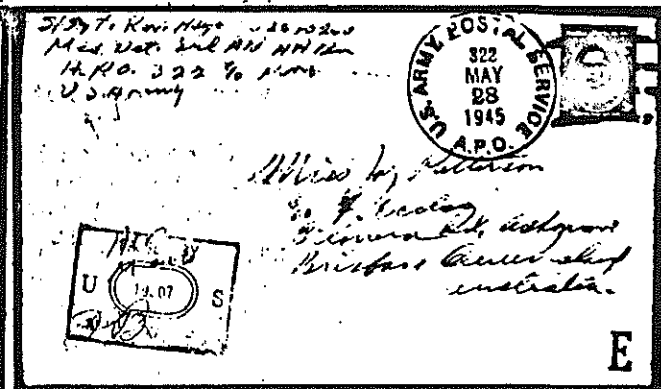
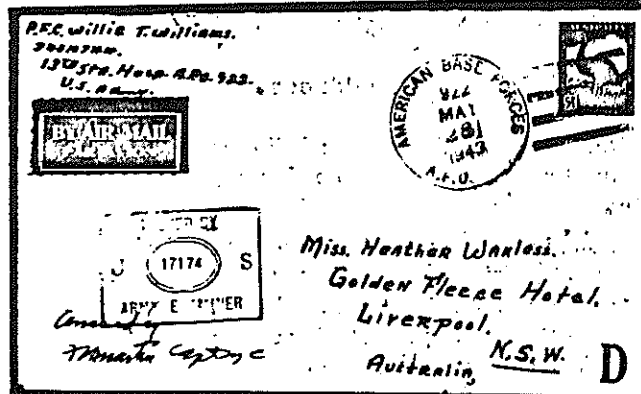
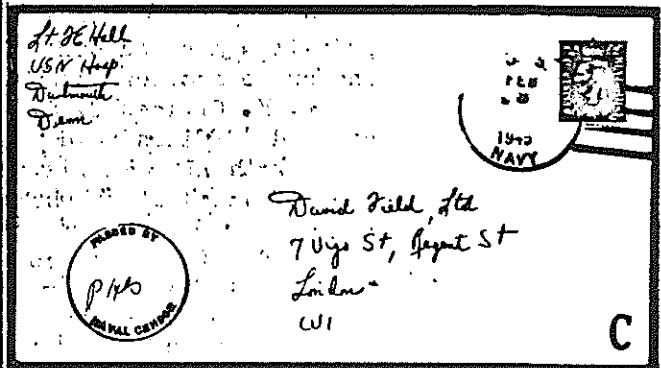
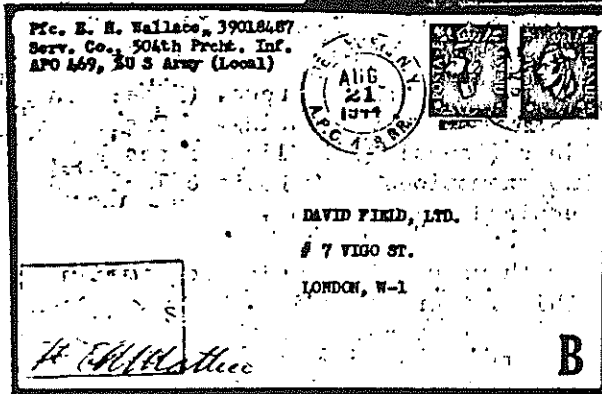
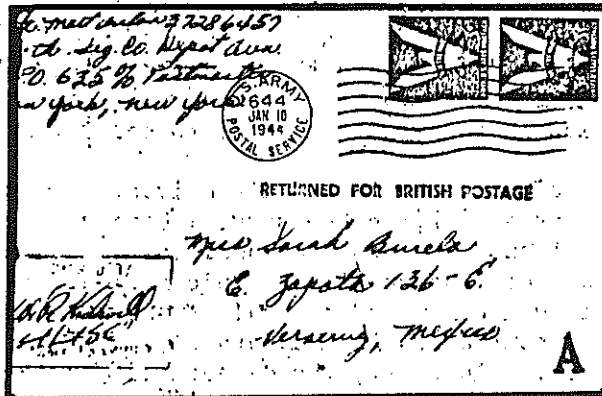
These few notes are concerned only with the legitimate use of foreign postage having military cancels of the U. S. Forces, as put forth in local and in U. S. Military directives, covering use of such postage, rather than with covers sent by soldier-collectors who ornamented their letters with the stamps of the various countries wherein they happened to be serving at the time.

Because of above-mentioned directives, it was mandatory for U. S. Military personnel, in the several countries, where U. S. Forces were stationed, to use the local postage when corresponding with civilians of that country. This ruling was extended, notably in the United Kingdom and several of the larger colonies, to include letters, sent by U. S. Military personnel, to other foreign countries. In short, the directives merely acquainted the U. S. Servicemen with the fact that these several countries were entitled to their normal postal revenue and that the "Free" franking privilege applied only to such mail as that to be sent statedide and/or to another member of the U. S. Armed Forces. (Note: In the U. K. Offices U. S. Military had free franking. These covers carried "Offices Paid" markings (Cancels?) in lieu of postage, along with APO cancels. The exemptions from Postage included such official items which required registration.

- COVER "A"** - The sender failed to comply with regulations which required the use of British Postage for this letter to Mexico. (I was fortunate in getting this cover with rubber-stamped "RETURN FOR BRITISH POSTAGE" as all others I've seen were inscribed in pencil. Some covers were sent thru (or were overlooked) without postage, but the percentage is comparatively small.
- COVER "B"** - Properly franked. Note "LOCAL" in return address.
- COVER "C"** - U. S. Naval cancel on British stamp. From Naval Hospital in Dartmouth. Naval Cancels on Brit. Postage are less plentiful than those with APO Cancels.
- There is, theoretically, a possible cover, franked with Brit. Postage, for every U. S. Army & Navy Post Office which was (or is) in operation. There were some 322 APOs in the U. K. during World War II. No doubt some of the interested collectors, in England, have managed to get themselves quite an accumulation of choice items.
- COVER "D"** - Cover franked with Australian stamp sent locally by a G. I. in Townsville, APO 922. Cover "E" - though sent from N. Guinea, APO 322, postage as island is within Australian mandate. 36 U. S. APOs operated in Aust. During World War II.
- COVER "F"** - APO cancel on Canadian stamp. From U.S.APO 692, Frobisher Bay, Baffin Is.
- COVER "G"** - Newfoundland seems to be the exception to the rule so far as their postage is concerned. All the covers I've seen which normally would require postage have come thru exactly as cover shown without APO cancel, stamp missing or torn off and with triangular "G.P.O. PASTAGE PAID" Cancel. This cancel I believe is common post office cancel used in local P. O. 's in Newfoundland.
