EDITORIAL REFLECTIONS

T HIS issue of the War Cover Club Bulletin begins Volume 2. During the past twelve months our hobby has gained many new followers and membership in the War Cover Club has more than doubled. With our own entry into the war, interest in the collecting of war covers will mount considerably. War Covers not only satisfy the collecting instinct inherent in all of us but they will remind us for many years to come of our struggle and effort to rid the

world of slavery and to re-establish human freedom, liberty and human rights. War covers tell a story of human interest, a story of history and the story of a changin g world. The field of war

cover collect-

ing is immense and one does not necessarily include in his collection every item. Specialization is quite easily accomplished. There are specialty collections of commercial censored covers, of military and naval covers, of prisoner of war and red cross covers and covers carrying propaganda inscriptions. One can confine his collection to war covers from our own United States or

one can limit his collections to covers of our allies. Philatelists will be interested in adding stamps to their collection of war covers. The Poster and Label enthusiast will find many patriotic labels and posters to include in a war cover collection. There are meter slogans and slogan cancelations on many war covers and the interest in war cover collecting will never lag.

Many members have asked me how our entry into the war will affect our hobby. First of all it will be impossible for us to secure covers as well as stamps from enemy countries. All mail between the United States and enemy countries as well as countries occupied by our enemies has been discontinued. It will of course be possible, subject to censorship restrictions, to obtain such items from neutral countries. However, such items should under no circumstances be purchased from neutral countries. In the first place this is unpatriotic and will enable our enemies to secure money for continuation of the war but you also might come into conflict with the "Trading with the Enemy Act." Therefore we must forego adding philatelic items of our enemies for the time being. This of course will not affect such material as is already in the possession of collectors and their duplicates. Trading in these can continue without the stigma of being unpatriotic. The absence of such items from collections need not worry collectors very much nor should collectors pay exhorbitant prices for any war cover. It is too early to know what covers will be valuable and which will be common. After we have won the war and all restrictions have been lifted, a great deal of material will come on the market. Only then can it be determined what will be scarce and what will not be scorce. It is believed that the demand for war covers at no time will exceed the supply for the number of collectors of war covers after all is comparatively small. It is better to pass a few items up at this time, even if it means paying a high price for a few items later, than to pay a high price for everything now. This has been the experience of many stamp collectors during the last world war and many philatelists have found this out to their sorrow.

The War Cover Club Bulletin will continue to list and illustrate all items and furnish its readers with as much information as consistent with our National Defense and censorship rulings and regulations. Whenever there should be any doubts in our mind as to the propriety of publishing certain information, same will be withheld rather than endanger our valiant and brave forces, who fight our battle for freedom, liberty and independence. We all will have to be very careful in divulging information, which we might inadvertently secure through our hobby, and the safety of our nation and our armed forces naturally comes before our hobby.

HE officers of the War Cover Club have given the membership dues of the club a great deal of consideration. Even though the War Cover Club Bulletin is published in the "Cover Collector," it has been necessary to subsidize the War Cover Club Bulletin as the publishers of the War Cover Club Bulletin have a great deal ofextra expense in making the many cuts for the illustrations of the censor markings listed in the bulletin. It was felt that a great deal of extra expense in makmaterially reduced if the publication of the War Cover Philatelist and the War Cover Club Bulletin can be combined. By doing this, dues can be reduced considerably and at the same time we shall be able to issue from time to time short bulletins to the membership, furnishing the same with additional information as well as information not readily adaptable for general public information. Delf Norona, the editor of the War Cover Philatelist, very graciously has been in full agreement with these views and I am in receipt of the following communication:

"To members of the War Cover Club:

"After careful consideration and after consultation with various officers, I have decided to discontinue the War Cover Philatelist at the end of the present club year.

"The membership dues of \$2.50 are too high and by dropping the Philatelist we will be able to reduce dues to \$1.50.

"However, I am ready to continue editing material relating to U. S. wars, particularly A. E. F. for the War Cover Club Bulletin,

been the backbone of the War Cover Club and the growth of the club has been largely due to his publicity in the War Cover Philatelist. It is planned that beginning with the May issue of the War Cover Club Bulletin, which incidentally will continue the name of the War Cover Philatelist, information of Delf Norona's will be combined with information regarding the present World War and the War Cover Philatelist will be published in the Cover Collector and combine everything on all wars. This action of course will be subject to the approval of the new officers of the War Cover Club to be elected in March but there is no doubt that they will agree to this improvement in the club's finances and organization.

With the combination of the two official organs of the War Cover Club, it has been proposed to reduce the annual dues of members to \$1.50 instead of \$2.50. In accordance with the Constitution and By-Laws such reduction in dues will be voted upon by the membership and this question will be included on the official ballot.

The proposed reduction in dues, however, need not keep prospective members from joining at this time. The officers are expected to arrange an adjustment of dues of members ioining the War Cover Club on and after Jan. 1, 1942, so that the new rate of dues will be in effect in their case. It is suggested that prospective members remit \$2 with their application, which amount will pay their dues under the old rate to the end of the present club year (April 15, 1942) and also pay their dues under the new rate until April 15, 1943.

In the December 1941 issue of the War Cover Club Bulletin under NEWFOUNDLAND three illustrations of censor labels were shown but only two censor labels were listed under the description. Therefore please add the following to the descriptions under Newfoundland:

CL-3—Black on white. Similar to CL-1 but smaller and thinner print.

EDITORIAL REFLECTIONS.

As will be noted from the above, President Sanford has directed the holding of the annual meeting of the War Cover Club in Cleveland, Ohio, on March 28, 1942. This annual meeting will be held during the annual open house party of Garfield-Perry Stamp Club. These annual parties of Garfield-Perry Stamp Club always have drawn a large attendance of stamp collectors from the East and the Middle West and it is sincerely hoped that many members of the War Cover Club will be able to attend the meeting and view some of the interesting exhibits of war covers.

It is with sincere regret that I report the illness of Eugene Carey, vice-president. It was around the middle of December that Gene, as we all affectionately call him, went to the University Hospital at Ann Arbor, Mich., for observation. Shortly after the first of the year the doctors decided upon an operation, from which he apparently recovered very nicely. However, on the sixth day after his operation, his condition took a turn for the worse. The

entire membership of the War Cover Club is anxiously awaiting good news from Ann Arbor and extends to Gene their sincerest wishes for a speedy and complete recovery.

We also hear that our secretary-treasurer is handing out cigars. A blessed event took place at his home a short time ago and a new war cover collector was born. Congratulations, Paul, and our best wishes to Mrs. Klinger and the baby.

At the annual election of officers of Garfield-Perry Stamp Club, President H. M. Sanford was reelected to the board of trustees of Garfield-Perry and your editor was elected vice-president. With three members of the War Cover Club, the third is Milton Cornman, being on the board of trustees of Garfield-Perry Stamp Club it looks as if Garfield-Perry members will not quickly forget about the collecting of war covers.

At the annual exhibition of the Cleveland Stamp Club at Hotel Hollenden on Jan. 31, 1942, one of the outstanding exhibits will be the display of "War Covers of All Wars of Modern Times" by our own Rev. William H. Tower of Montclair, N. J. This will be an invitational exhibit and the War Cover Club is proud that one of its members has been honored by the exhibition committee of the Cleveland Stamp Club, which I dare say used excellent judgment.

My attention has been called to an editorial in "Western Stamp Collector" of Jan. 21, 1942, entitled "Naval and Military Information." In this editorial the publisher criticizes that cachet and cover notices, involving ships of our navy, naval bases or military establishments are published in certain stamp publications and proudly calls attention to the fact that his publication has discontinued its two naval covers and cachet or cover notices of items having to do with our armed forces. He continues that collectors should not be so selfish as to desire to bother either the navy or army posts with demands for cancelations, and designates all such material as "made-to-order stuff." I cannot quite agree with Al Van-Dahl's viewpoint. In the first place, publication of information in stamp magazines of news, which is widely circulated by the daily press and the official U. S. Postal Bulletin, most definitely cannot be construed as a violation of military or naval secrets or the censorship laws. We all know that we have bases in Iceland, in British Guiana, in Bermuda and other places.

Covers are still coming through showing the name of the navy vessel as part of its cancelation. As a matter of fact I just received a letter from a marine sergeant, stationed at Midway Island, telling me of his experience. His letter states that he is still at Midway Island, his cover is postmarked Pearl Harbor Hawaii, and the cover bears the censor marking of his superior marine corps officer as well as the naval censor marking apparently applied in Hawaii. Such information to my mind can be published without fear of violating any defense secrets. On the other hand, I have noted that some collectors are sending covers to various naval ships and posts of our armed forces, placing secret marks on such covers in order to be able to determine where the cover was canceled. Please discontinue this! In the first place it is not fair, for when a cover carries a "Z" type naval cancelation, it was applied for the purpose of keeping the name of the ship a military secret. Secondly, such secret code markings may cause the covers to be destroyed by the censor and, last but not least, it might cause our military and naval officials to prohibit further accommodations to collectors in the cancelation of covers.

Insofar as Al VanDahl's comment regarding the bothering of army or navy mail clerks for cancelations are concerned, I doubt very much whether the cancelation of such mail is a bother to these men. We all can rest assured that whenever their time is occupied with national defense duties, our mail as well as that of everyone else will not be attended to. Last but not least, all such mail does not have

the stigma of "made-to-order stuff." I appreciate that a battle-scarred letter from the actual seat of operation adds interest to our collection but not all of us can obtain such historic items. Made-to-order material aids us just the same in our research work and through such made-to-order items we will be able at a later date to determine much information which otherwise might be lost. Let us all be sane in our collecting and sane in our viewpoint. We do not help our country to win the war by discontinuing our collecting, or by destroying stamps and covers originating in enemy countries, which were issued prior to our entry into the war. Neither will we help our enemies by refusing to tell about their stamps and covers. We will help our country to a final victory by keeping a clear

outlook, by keeping our heads, by continuing our hobbies, which relax us and always by buying Defense Stamps and Defense Bonds to the limit of our ability.

The famous Arthur Barger collection of war covers was to be sold by Irwin Heiman, one of New York's well known auction firms, on Feb. 6, 1942. Unfortunately, when this is received by the membership, the auction will already have been held but many undoubtedly have received the catalogue of the sale.

I am very much indebted to L.W. Staehle of New York, N. Y., for some very attractive cacheted covers from some of our bases. Mr. Staehle is a real artist and his covers and designs add materially to one's collection.

The Sales Department of the War Cover Club is badly in need of additional material. Sales have mounted steadily and the renewed interest in war covers, since our own entry into the war, has cleaned up most of the circuits in rapid order. Covers from our American armed forces, commercial covers, carrying United States censor markings, and other items of the present war are particularly in demand. If you have some duplicates, why not dispose of them through the sales department. On the other hand, the Sales Department also offers the collector an excellent source of supply of war covers at attractive prices.

Gimbel's Department Store in New York puts out some very attractive patriotic envelopes, canceled at some of our army bases abroad. I am very grateful to them for much information about such covers, which was submitted to me and helped me a great deal to properly classify some of the cancelations.

In the October, 1941, issue of the War Cover Club Bulletin, I illustrated what I believed to be, a censor marking under Lebanon. This marking was described under "CM-5" and consisted of "O. A. T." in --20--

large capital letters within an oval. Some question was raised as to the marking having been applied by a censor and member L. L. Durkin is of the opinion that this marking is the abbreviation of "Ottaman Air Transport." Has anyone else some information on this?

Spain

Censor markings of Spain properly should be divided between those applied during the Spanish Civil War, which had its beginning in July, 1936, and those applied during the present war, which began on Sept. 2, 1939. Unfortunately, no definite sign of demarcation can be noted and I believe many of the markings used during the Spanish civil war remained in use for censorship purposes during the present war. As a matter of fact, Spain seems to be the only neutral country which resorts to a censorship of its mail during the present war. Whether this censorship is due to the desire of the government to remain strictly neutral and through its censorship avoid any espionage among some of the residents of belligerents or whether the same is due

to internal conditions only, of course is not definitely known at this time. As far as possible I have tried to separate the listing and description of Spain's censor markings according to the cancelation dates on the respective covers, whenever these dates were sufficiently legible. However, I am very much afraid the listings of these various markings by no means is complete. If any one has made a thorough study of the civil war markings, and is in position to offer additional descriptions and information, as well as proper illustrations. I shall very much appreciate hearing. In addition to the illustrations. I am listing a number of censor markings, listed by cities. These additional markings were compiled by Harry Smuckler and printed in the "Western Stamp Collector." I have assigned my own numbering system to Mr. Smuckler's list. In numbering the censor markings of Spain, I am using numbers 1 to 99 for those I believe to be civil war items and numbers 100 to 199 for those I believe to have been used during the present war.

m \, Y}$ the time this issue of the War Cover Club Bulletin reaches you. you will have received by separate mail the official ballot as well as the proposed amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws of the War Cover Club. The ballots must be received by the Chairman of the Election Committee, Mr. Arthur F. Black, prior to midnight of March 20, 1942 in order to be counted. It is hoped that each and every member. entitled to vote, will fill out the ballot and make his preferences known. In connection with the proposed amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws it is believed that the changes will offer the Club a better working arrangement. Your editor will be glad to answer any questions pertaining to these changes, which any of the members desire to have further information on.

President H. M. Sanford has been appointed co-chairman of the Exhibition Committee of Garfield-Perry Stamp Club for the annual open house party of that club. As stated in the February issue of the Bulletin, the annual meeting of the War Cover Club will be held in conjunction with this open house party and Mr. Sanford has made arrangements for a War Cover Club exhibit. Inasmuch as the number of available frames for this purpose will be somewhat limited, it has been decided to make the War Cover exhibit an invitational and non-competitive one. It is hoped, however, that in the near future a competitive exhibit for members of the War Cover Club can be held. Perhaps this opportunity might offer itself at the time of the Annual Convention of the American Philatelic Society, which also will be held this year in Cleveland during the latter part of August. It is hoped that many of the War Cover Club members will be able to visit Cleveland on March 28 and attend our annual meeting.

The War Cover Club Bulletin hereafter will be issued again in mimeographed form once a month and the War Cover Philatelist will be issued monthly, beginning with the April issue, in the Cover Collector, The new War Cover Philatelist will be a combination of features heretofore published in the Cover Collector by George C. 

NAVAL POSTMARKS.

Below are illustrated and listed the various types of U.S. Navy cancelations, seen and reported so far, which do not show the ship's name and location.

In the parlance of naval cover collectors these postmarks, I believe, are called "z" type cancels. They are used to prevent the name and location of the naval ships becoming known. These types of cancels were first used during the first world war and again placed into use by order of the U. S. Navy Department during March of 1941. With our own entry into the second world war the use of these types of cancels is rapidly becoming universal although from time to time I still notice naval cancelations showing the name of the ship as part of the cancel. Many of the "z" type cancelers have been made on board of the ship or locally in port, pending receipt of the offical canceler from the Post Office Department. Such "home made" cancelers often are crude and often vary slightly from the illustrated types.

United States Postal Cards

The fourth design of United States domestic postal cards made its appearance in 1886 and superceded the third design after it had been in use only about one year. The new card measured 3x51/k inches, a size which had been adopted for the first cards in 1873 and used for all types since that time. It was printed in black on buff cardboard and the design provided a striking contrast to anything which had preceded it.

The stamp and the title inscriptions of the card are combined in a single design which is centered in the upper half of the card. The stamp consists of a circular medallion bearing a profile portrait of Jefferson facing the right. Beneath this medallion is a value inscription reading "One Cent." Above the medallion is a ribbon bearing the inscription, "United States," at the left is the word "Postal," and at the right the word "Card." All of these elements are combined with borders and foliated lines to form the design of the card. Beneath in small gothic letters is the warning, "Nothing but the address to be on this side."

This card was apparently more satisfactory than the previous type for it remained in use for at least five years. The only variety noticed has ruled lines on the face of the card to assist the user in writing the name and address. The top line of the three is preceded by the script letter "M."

The unusual position of the stamp on the card offered difficulty to some postmasters as shown by the postmarks or cancelations. In about half of the used cards examined no attempt was made to place the cancelation on the stamp portion, but it was struck in the usual position in the upper right corner of the card. Others placed the town mark squarely in the upper right and struck the stamp with a killer at a second operation.

This design was the last of the small postal cards except those issued as filing cards.

Cover Collector. Inasmuch as this question undoubtedly is in the minds of many readers, we are glad of the opportunity to reply to this question. The War Cover Club is an organization formed entirely of collectors of war covers of all wars. There is a community of interest among the membership, which is not existent among readers of a magazine. Members write each other on questions pertaining to the collecting of war covers; visit each other and view each others' collections. thereby establishing a strong bond between themselves, which bond is not only helpful in the pursuit of their hobby but also makes for far stronger friendships. Furthermore, the War Cover Club operates a Saids Department, which in the year of its operation has proven itself most successful. Through the Sales Department members have the opportunity of acquiring needed material at attractive prices and at the same time are able to dispose of their duplicates without fuss or trouble. About half of the membership of the War Cover Club is taking advantage of this service and the Sales Department has been instrumental in increasing many collections of members. Members of the War Cover Club also have the onportunity of securing covers from the various military and naval establishments of our own United States forces at a small service charge. The War Cover Club also offers members assistance in explaining war markings on covers. the exchange of information as to the origin of certain covers and the compilation of such records. Through the combining of collectors, interested in the same hobby, it is possible to defend members against frauds, unnecessary governmental interference with the hobby during war times and last but not least protect members in every possible way. The supplements to the War Cover Club Bulletin, which will be issued free of charge to the membership, will be an informal letter to the membership, keeping them posted on any new developments of the hobby, answer questions and contain short and pertinent articles written by specialists and students of war cover collecting. In the January issue we stated that we did not know whether any censor markings existed on mail from St. Pierre et Miquelon. Through the kindness and courtesy of member George J. Zimmerman we car markings exist. One cover carries a plain white label, cut at the edges, and carries the inscription "CONTROLE" applied by means of a rubber stamp

and printed in a dark blue. Another label reported is a plain white label with perforated edges and without the inscription. Each of these labels are tied to the cover with a double circle imprinted again with the same dark blue ink. This circular hand stamp carries the inscription "*CONTROLE* / POSTAL" in the outer circle and inside the circle the inscription reads: "ILES / SAINT / PIERRE / ET / MIQUELON." According to George J. Zimmerman this hand stamp also has been applied in black.

In connection with present censorship restrictions on mail to and from our military and naval forces, it is again suggested that any covers sent to military and naval stations be sent unsealed. I have found that such covers, even if unsealed, will receive censor markings if you so request in a letter accompanying the covers. As take as we know no objection has been raised by any of the authorities to canceling covers for collectors. However it must be born in mind that many of the clerks at these post offices are ex-

ceedingly busy and often cannot be bothered with canceling covers from collectors. At the same time space on board ships is badly needed for the prosecution of the war and for legitimate mail to and from these military and naval forces. Therefore do not be disappointed if some of the covers are not returned or if the cancelation is not according to your liking. Be moderate in your demands and requests.

Should the location of United States censorship stations be listed according to the censor numbers in use at such stations? The following letter was received by your editor from Byron Price, Director of Censorship, on this subject:

"It is not considered in the best interests of our war effort to publicize through newspapers, magazines, or other medium the location of our censorship stations. I appreciate your inquiry, and I know that you will want to assist us in preventing the possible interception of any information that might prove of value to the enemy."

The answer to my inquiry, as printed above, seems to be quite at variance with an answer apparently received by Arthur W. Lee and published by him in the International Postal Slogan Society bulletin. In this magazine it is stated that the Office of Censorship replied in part as follows:

"There is nothing in the voluntary press censorship code produced and interpreted by this office concerning postage, postage collecting, or cancellations."

We believe that it is better to be careful and avoid any possibility of publishing information that in any way whatsoever might aid our enemy. We do not pretend to be able to distinguish what information will be harmful to our prosecution of the war and which will not be harmful. Therefore, the less information as to the location of our bases, the location of our post of-

fices abroad, the places where letters have been censored or the names of navy ships or military units is published, the less opportunity there will exist of giving away some military secret our enemies may find helpful to them. This, however, does not prevent individual members from compiling and recording such information for fture records. It is our intention to list only such information as already has become public property. For instance the list of U.S.A. Censorship Stations is published in the Postal Bulletin. These stations are:



Through the kindness and co-oneration of member Ian C. Morgan we are listing below and illustrating the various types of Army Postmarks seen so far, on mail from army post ofices of the Royal Canadian Engineers. Articles of this type are most welcome and of great assistance to the editor. It is hoped that other members will undertake similar research and send their findings to the editor. Member Ian C. Morgan deserves a great deal of credit and thanks from the entire membership for his work.

MP-1-Wide space between words "FIELD POST OFFICE." Steel die canceller.

MP-la-Same as MP-1 but letters are taller and smaller (Example FPO No. 4)

Steel die canceller. MP-2-Words 'FIELD POST OFFICE'

close together. Steel die canceller. MP-3-Words "FIELD" and "POST" almost one word with space between "POST" and "OFFICE" Steel die can-

culler. MP-4-Similar to type MP-1 but letters smaller. Steel die canceller.

MP-5-Machine cancelation. Two slugs as illustrated with five wavy lines between; one slug with a small cross below date line, the other slug does not carry this small cross.

MP-6-Rubber hand stamp. This stamp comes in a variety of sizes.

MP-7a-Carries "No. 1" in bottom of circle instead of the plain numeral, others. erwise same as type MP-7. Steel die can-

MP-8-Similar to type MP-2, but without other frame, which seems to have been filed off. Steel die canceller.

MP-6-This postmark is being used by the Home Depot. Steel die canceller. MP-10-Rubber hand stamp. Used by

Home Depot.

MP-10a-Rubber hand stamp. Same as type MP-10, but inscription reads: "HOME DEPOT — A. P. O."

MP-11-Steel die canceller. Used by the Home Depot. MP-12-Steel die canceller. This can-

celler is used for parcel post sendings. MP-12a-Steel die canceller. Same as Type MP-12 but wording is narrower. Note: Type MP-12 and MP-12a are sometimes used at Home Depot in purple as a buckstamp. Seen used at F. P. O.'s imprinted in black, (Iceland).


MP-13-Machine cancelation. Seen on mail from: A Royal Norwegian Air Force in England; B. Similar on mail from Malta.

MP-14-Machine cancelation. Seen on mail from Canadian Forestry Corps in



CENSOR LABELS.

Many covers seen from Surinam show a numbering machine numeral stamped on the label tieing to some extent the label to the cover.

CL-1-Black on white. Double inscription, head to head, Short black dashes below imprint indicate where labels are to be separated.

Cl.-la-lilack on white. Same as Type CL-1, but without the period and only a single inscription on each label. CL-lb-Black on white. Same as Type - CM - 5

CL-1a, but letters of inscription heavier, larger and wide apart. Inscription measures 72 millimeters whereas inscription on Type CL-12 measures only 65 millimeters.

United States Postal Cards

ROM 1873 until 1891 the post office department issued four designs of domestic postal cards, all in the rather small size measuring 3 by 51/4 inches. In 1891 a new design was adopted and the size was greatly increased so that the cards measured 3% by 6% inches. A few cards have turned up which measure 31/2 by 61/8, but as these had printed addresses and apparently were enclosed with a letter for a prepaid reply it is thought that they were privately cut down in order to make possible their insertion in standard envelopes.

The design for this large card shows a three-quarter portrait of Grant facing left in a vertical ellipse which is decorated below and at the sides with a wreath of laurel. This portrait occupies the normal position for a stamp and the remainder of the upper third of the card contains inscriptions and titles. At the top in small type are the words "Postal Card One Cent," while just below in shaded English text within a decorated frame are the words "United States of America." Below the latter in a small panel

is the inscription, "This side is for the address only."

The cardboard used for this issue is a light buff and is generally uniform in shade. The portrait and lettering are in black, but this varies from an intense black to a rather grayish tone.

A variety of this card has been seen which has the printed portions at the bottom. If the address is placed on such a card in the normal position, the printing appears inverted. The variety is due to an error in cutting up the large multiple sheets of cards.

While this large Grant card was in use a great many were backed up with lithographic views of the Columbian exposition and sold in sets at the fair grounds.

Coincident with the issuance of the large card was the appearance of a very small card measuring 3 by 4 % inches. This had the identical portrait design of Grant, with a slightly modified group of inscriptions. This small Grant card, the sixth design of domestic one cent cards, was printed in blue or dark blue on grayish white cardboard. The Grant cards were superseded in 1894 by a new series bearing the portrait of Jefferson.

THE COVER COLLECTOR

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE WAR COVER CLUB: MAY

As many members of the War Cover Club already have been informed, the decision has been forced upon me to discontinue many of my philatelic activities. When this proposal was made, it was with the expectation that the officers would be in position to assist me in these undertakings. However, the time of the officers apparently was absorbed by other duties and they were unable to devote the necessary time to the affairs of the Club. Nevertheless I continued to devote all of my free time and efforts to the Club.

At no time was I "ambitious" to keep on with the publication of an official organ nor did I desire to dominate the organization. My efforts were entirely to keep the promise to one hundred members, which was accomplished.

Last summer, when I realized the impossibility of fulfilling all of the duties, assigned to me, unaided. I suggested to Delf Norona, who was

appointed Editor of the War Cover Club, that he assist me and undertake the physical work of publishing the War Cover Club Bulletin. However, he felt that he already was overburdened and had to decline assistance. I continued therefore to edit the War Cover Club Bulletin, manage the Sales Department, look after publicity and recruiting. Voluminous correspondence naturally ensued with its attending additional demands upon my time.

Since the election of new officers I endeavored to divide the necessary work among some of the members. Unfortunately those approached were, like myself, busily engaged with other activities and had to decline to carry on. Therefore, I have no other choice but to call a definite halt to my own full participation in view of other urgent demands made on my time and energy.

I sincerely hope the officers of the War Cover Club will soon find some one to replace me. I extend, in conclusion, to the officers and members my heartiest good wishes for continued success and growth of the War Cover Club.
