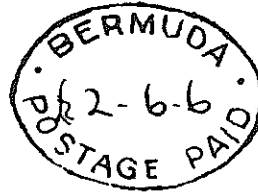

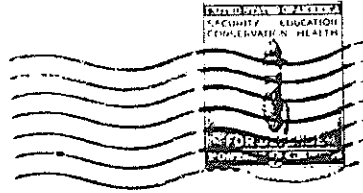

COVER OF THE MONTH

Winston Churchill, Prime Minister of Great Britain, arrived unheralded in Washington a few days before Christmas for his historic visit to the United States and Canada.

That being the time when people were sending out Christmas cards, it is not surprising that many took the opportunity of sending cards to Mr. Churchill. These were inscribed in various ways: Mr. Winston Churchill, The Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, MP, and so on, and addressed At the White House, C/o The White House. The British Embassy, C/o President Roosevelt, and sent by ordinary mail, air mail, and special delivery. One is even noted with insufficient postage and requiring postage due.

From information received, some 100 covers were saved, the balance destroyed under supervision, and these are being sold, the proceeds divided between the American Red Cross and the British War Relief. From a consignment received the editor offers: One cover addressed to Mr. Churchill during his visit, plus three addressed to the British Embassy at Washington, each from a different county, and all mailed in a large size official British Registered Package envelope bearing the Bermuda AIR MAIL and POSTAGE PAID handstamps illustrated. The amounts of postage written in the handstamp vary from 15/- to Two Pounds. Price for the five items One Dollar. Cash with order please.

A cover addressed to King George VI during his visit in 1939 sold for 55 Pounds at a Red Cross benefit Auction Sale recently in England.

 WAR COVER PHILATELIST TO BE DISCONTINUED

It is my intention to discontinue the War Cover Philatelist with the next issue.

For a couple of years I was anxious to have some one other than myself publish this little quarterly, and I even approached the editor and publisher of Postal Markings to incorporate the W.C.P. as part of Postal Markings, thus making the latter the official organ of the War Cover Club. However, members at the Washington convention in 1940 expressed the desire to have a separate publication as the official organ of the club, and as the W.C.P. was the logical medium I continued with its publication despite the fact it costs some \$20 or so a year for "editorial" and incidental expenses not charged to publishing costs.

With the appearance of the "War Cover Club Bulletin" and its adoption as an additional official organ of the club, dues were stepped up to \$2.50 to take care of the added expense. After nine months' trial it has been pointed out--and I agree--that \$2.50 dues a year is too much for a club such as ours, and dues should be reduced to \$1.50. The only way to do this is to drop one of the official organs, and as Mr. Hahn is ambitious to keep on with his Bulletin now published as part of Covers magazine, I am willing to drop publication of the W.C.P. and save myself the expense and work of taking care of subscriptions and the like.

Now that we are at war, numerous U.S. war cover items will be created. We may expect new A.E.F. covers, not from one, but from many portions of the globe. Start collecting now, but be very careful in making unusual requests. Postal and military officials might not understand why we may want certain things.

A.E.F. TYPE A-55 POSTMARKS

On Sept. 13, 1918, the Military Postal Express Service was redesignated Postal Express Service, and this Type A-55 postmark shows the renamed service.

Earliest known: NOV 28 1918 (APO 918 and 925)

Latest known: 19 JUL 1919 (APO 975) Eugene Carey A-55



Several Type A-55 postmarks have been seen apparently in the 800 series (809, 811, 819, &c.) but it is possible they are indistinct postmarks of the 900 series (909, 911, 919, &c.); therefore they are not listed below. We particularly wish to inspect distinctly struck impressions of any 800 series Type A-55 postmarks.

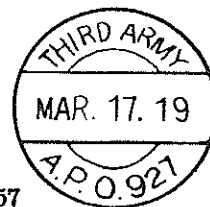
No specimens of Type A-56 have been identified as being used at any given Army Post Office.

A.E.F. TYPE A-57 POSTMARKS

This type of postmark was obviously made in Germany as it is of the same general design as German postmarks of the period.

Earliest use: MAR 13 19 (APO 710 and 927)
Latest use: MAY -9 22 (APO 927)

However, the date "June 3" was obviously a solid part of the postmark for it is found on four different covers with dates from Feb 1 1919 to April 5 1919, in addition to one with the notation "Ans. June 29, 1918." Also, a cover is known with slightly different type but with "-y 31"(1918) instead of "June 3."

However, these are classified as A type postmarks only when used as town postmark. There are various styles of ornaments below the date, which is surrounded by either single or double lines.
