POSTMARKS AND CENSOR MARKS OF THE A.E.F. SIBERIA


According to a magazine article the first American unit, the 27th Infantry, arrived at Vladivostock August 16, 1918, followed by the 31st, both from Manila, and about the end of September some 4,000 men of the 8th Division was sent from Camp Fremont, Calif. There were between 9,000 and 10,000 American soldiers in all in Siberia. The last units left Siberia on April 1, 1920.



REMARKS ON THE PRISON CAMP IN EAST SIBERIA UNDER AMERICAN

CONTROL, 1919-20

(By F.J.Carter, Luscombe Terrace, Dawlish, Devon, England.)

My authority for the existence of this camp is Miss Elsa Brandstrom's book Among Prisoners of War in Russia and

The authoress was a prominent member of the Swedish Red Cross, and her book is the best which has appeared on this subject. On p. 261 she says, "In eastern Siberia one camp was taken over entirely by the Americans and two by the Japanese. Here the prisoners were extremely well treated and got plenty of everything to which they were entitled as prisoners of war."

There is philatelic evidence as to one of the Japanese camps, Perweja Riechka, in the existence of cards from there

with Japanese censor marks.

For the American camp there is less philatelic evidence, but there is evidence to show that the Americans had control of the censoring of other camps.

The following cards shew American influence and censor

control:

- (1) Printed general P.O.W. card from Omsk camp dated 25 Jan. 1919. Bears the Russian VLADIVOSTOK censor and the American censor No. 421.
- (2) Printed special card from Krasnoyarak, dated 20-7-19. This card has only a Russian censor but contrary to the usual practice is printed in bad French, 'der' instead of 'des,' Russian and English. The wording 'Prisoner of War mail' is evidence of American influence, although this camp at the time was in control of the Czech Legion. (See illustration on next page.)

(3) Japanese field post card from Vladivostock camp addressed to Germany in English and forwarded through the Y.M.C.A. New York. Russian VLADIVOSTOK censor. Although this is a Japanese field card, I think it most likely came from the camp under American control, which was probably at or near Vladivostock.



Use was occasionally made by our men of Japanese envelopes some manufactured of 'rice paper' others of wood veneer. These Japanese envelopes are occasionally illustrated with hand-colored pictures of Japanese scenes, and make very attractive items for an A.E.F. collection.

Stamped Japanese letter sheets were also used by American soldiers, the stamps having no franking value, but they are neverless canceled with the regular A.E.F. Siberia postmarks.
